53 Accidental Deaths In Canada Over Holiday

Seven Fatalities Occur In Maritimes

SAINT JOHN, N. B., July 2—(CP)—Holiday week-end accidents in New Brunswick took a toll of five lives and sent two to hospital. Dead are: Lillian June Hall, 11, Saint John, who drowned in the Belleisle River; Mrs. Josephine Barker, 18, Ormoco, killed in a car crash near Fredericton and Adrian Levesque, 24, Grand Falls, who accidentally shot himself in an out-of-season hunting accident; William Scott and Miss Lillian Day, both 15 years of age and both residents of North of Keswick, 10 miles from Fredericton, who were almost instantly killed Sunday night when the motorcycle on which they were riding ploughed into the rear of a parked truck on the highway near their home.

RESERVE, N. S., July 2—(CP)—Carl Fisher, 44, of Sydney, (96 Intercolonial St.), N. S., was found dead in a ditch on the Sydney-Glace Bay highway near here today. R.C.M.P. are investigating and an autopsy was performed. An inquest will be held Friday.

HALIFAX, July 2—(CP)—William Cooper, 18, of Halifax (2904 Merrill St.) drowned in Cameron's Lake, 20 miles north of here, late today when a boat from which he was fishing overturned. Two other youths in the boat swam to shore.

Henri Queuille Forms New French Cabinet

PARIS, July 2—(Reuters)—Radical Henri Queuille today formed a French cabinet with the surprise appointment of Paul Reynaud, a former premier and an anti-Communist, as minister responsible for policy in the Far East. Reynaud is known as a resolute advocate of energetic co-operation with the United States and Britain.

Dr. Queuille, 66, formed the cabinet in record time under the pressure of the crisis in Korea. Robert Schuman of the Communist Movement, Republican Populaire (M. R. P.), who sponsored the plan for a European coal-steel merger, remains foreign minister.

Reynaud also will be responsible for relations with the Associated States—the three newly-formed Indo-Chinese Governments of Viet Nam, Cambodia and Laos.

The former prime minister, Georges Bidault of M. R. P., whose government fell a week ago over a Socialist bid to raise civil service wages, becomes vice-premier.

The new Government shows a slight move to the right and may thus arouse opposition among the Socialists, who have agreed in principle to support it without joining the cabinet.

Political circles here interpret Reynaud's inclusion as an outward symbol of French determination to play a full part in the Atlantic Pact and in supporting the United Nations in Korea.

Mexico, U. K. Reach Trade Agreement

LONDON, July 2—(AP)—An agreement on trade between Mexico and Great Britain has been reached in London, a well-informed diplomatic source said Saturday.

The agreement, resulting from a month's negotiations here between a Mexican trade mission headed by Carlos Novoa of the Bank of Mexico and Board of Trade Officials, provides for an increased exchange of goods between the two countries.

The Anglo-Mexican arrangement will be officially announced in London and Mexico City next week, the source said.

Discuss U. N. Set-Up To Direct Forces In Korea

OTTAWA, July 2—(CP)—Canada is sharing in discussions about the need for a United Nations set-up to direct international forces in the fight against North Korean aggression, official sources said tonight.

They said Canada, which has offered military aid, is quite satisfied to have Gen. Douglas MacArthur continue as commander-in-chief of the forces participating in U. N. police action on behalf of the South Korean republic.

The question now to be resolved is the link to be forged between Gen. MacArthur's Tokyo headquarters and Lake Success in a way that would establish the united international character of that action.

Officials here tabbed Wednesday as a day of double-barrelled developments affecting Canada's own

possible role as one of the countries whose forces would fight under the General.

The navy said that has been definitely set as the day three destroyers, the Athabaskan, Cayuga and Sioux, will sail out of Esquimalt, B. C., naval base and head for Pearl Harbor to be closer to Korea if the U.N. accepts Canada's offer of their use.

The External Affairs Department said Wednesday also is probably the day the U. N.'s Security Council will meet to discuss the question of the link between itself and Gen. MacArthur.

Officials there said it is "highly unlikely" that Canada will be advised before that meeting whether the destroyers actually are going to be needed in Korea.

If they don't go into Korean action, they will exercise off Pearl Harbor anyway.

Will Seek To Halt Advance Of Invaders

(By The Associated Press)
TOKYO, July 3—(Monday)—Four North Korean columns, at least two of them led by tanks, struck southward today toward United States infantry moving up to meet them south of fallen Seoul.

The South Korean airfield and town of Suwon, 20 miles south of Seoul, was outflanked by two of the columns which cut southeastward 10 miles or so from Seoul. American planes attacked one of the columns.

A North Korean broadcast claimed yet another column had seized Wonju, 50 miles southeast of Seoul. This was unconfirmed. If true, this would make at least five columns slashing southward.

In aerial warfare United States Superforts, escorted by Australian fighters, struck 135 miles into North Korea and blasted the airfield at Yonpo. Pilots said results were good and the field was left covered in smoke.

A United States air communiqué also reported that American and Australian fighters Sunday shot down a hostile plane bearing the Red Star of Russia. It may have been a North Korean plane hurried into action without changing the insignia.

Frank Sinatra Signs Three-year Contract

LONDON, July 2—(AP)—Frank Sinatra has signed a three-year contract for radio and television shows with Columbia Broadcasting System, the singer's manager said here today.

Under the contract Sinatra will appear in weekly radio and television shows for 39 weeks in each year.

Find Body Of Missing Man

The body of Donald MacNevin, 38, of New Haven was found floating in the water near West River Bridge yesterday evening. The man had been missing from his home since last Thursday.

Coroner Dr. J. D. MacGulgan ordered an inquest which will be held at the Cutcliffe Funeral Home, New Haven, Friday evening at 7.30. An autopsy will be held on the body today.

War Bride's Heroism Fails To Save Husband, Helper Trapped In Mine

GREENWOOD, B. C., July 2—(CP)—Out of the rugged British Columbia interior tonight came a story of a Dutch war bride's courage in attempting to save the lives of her husband and another man trapped in the shaft of an old mine.

The rescue attempt failed the woman's heroic efforts to pull the men from the 80-foot shaft with a chain attached to a jeep.

This was the story as told by Provincial Police in this little community 175 miles east of Vancouver.

Leo Morris, 28, and Raymond Galloway, 29, were pumping water from the shaft at the Waterloo mineral claim Friday night.

Morris went into the shaft to rig the gasoline pump so it would operate through the night.

Overcome By Fumes

When he didn't come back Galloway went to investigate. He saw Morris lying at the bottom of the shaft, overcome by fumes.

He rushed to Morris' cottage to summon Morris' wife, Betta, 24, and to get a jeep.

At the pithead, Galloway rigged a chain to the jeep and lowered himself into the shaft. The only light he had was the beam from a flashlight.

Mrs. Morris said she 'couldn't drive.

"You've got to drive," Galloway said, Mrs. Morris countered later. Galloway descended into the gas-choked shaft.

Once at the bottom, he fastened the chain around Morris. Then he signalled with the flashlight.

Mrs. Morris drove the jeep ahead, raising the two men.

When a body reached the top of the shaft, she halted the jeep and ran back. Only one man, her husband, was at the top.

Frankly, she tried artificial respiration. It was no use. Morris was dead.

Trans-Canada Highway Paving Contract Let

Contract for the paving of the first portion of the Trans-Canada Highway in Prince Edward Island, subject to approval by the Federal Department of Resources and Development, has been awarded to Curran and Briggs Ltd., of Summerside, it was announced yesterday by Premier J. Walter Jones.

Contract price for the ten-mile stretch on the south shore road between Charlottetown and Borden is \$187,700 the Premier said. The hard surfacing of the highway will start at Bonshaw and extend west beyond Crapaud and close to North Tryon.

The contract calls for the paving of the ten miles to be completed not later than Oct. 16 next. Several other contractors tendered on the hard surfacing project.

Sudden Death Of Queen Square School Teacher Yesterday

A well known and highly esteemed member of the teaching staff of Queen Square School, Miss Agnes Murnaghan of Charlottetown, died suddenly yesterday afternoon about four o'clock.

She was stricken with a heart attack at the intersection of Queen and Dorchester Streets as she was returning home from supervising catechetical examinations in the school. She died before medical aid could be obtained.

Miss Murnaghan was prominent in educational circles, having taught as Queen Square School for about thirty eight years. Previous to teaching in the City school she taught for a short time in Middleton where she entered the profession.

She was born in Charlottetown, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Murnaghan. She received her early education in Notre Dame Convent and later attended Prince of Wales College.

She is survived by one brother, Patrick Murnaghan, Charlottetown, and a sister, Mary, of Midway, Massachusetts. A number of brothers and sisters predeceased her.

Parliament Prorogues

OTTAWA, July 2—(CP)—The second session of Canada's 21st Parliament, quiet through most of its 90 sitting days, was prorogued Friday amid an atmosphere of concern over the war in Korea.

Prime Minister St. Laurent announced that three Canadian destroyers will move to Pearl Harbor to be closer to the scene if needed for action by United Nations and said Parliament will be reconvened if the situation in Korea deteriorates.

As is customary, a formal date for a new session was fixed at Aug. 9. In normal circumstances, Parliament will not meet again until early next year.

Spokesmen for the opposition parties applauded the government's decision to recall Parliament in the event of an emergency. The speech from the throne described the Korean situation as a "serious threat to peace."

Czech Communist Party Announces Huge Purge

Those who "in spite of good will cannot understand and carry out the party's policy" will merely be crossed off the party list. This rule will get rid of them without imposing the stigma of expulsion.

Others "who have not fulfilled their duties for lack of political consciousness but who have shown signs they will overcome their faults" will be reduced to the status of candidates.

During the last probationary period, from Oct. 1, 1948 to Jan. 31, 1949, the party purged 107,133 members. It cut its rolls to 2,311,066, including 1,788,383 members and 522,683 candidates.

"This time probation will be much stricter and more thorough than in 1948," the committee declared.

The Czech Communist Party—one of the largest outside the Soviet Union—heads the National Front, a coalition that runs the Government.
