W. J. Hancox To Replace A. W. Gaudet

Replacing A.W. Gaudet as the Charlottetown Board of Trade's voting delegate at the 70th annual meeting of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade will be W. J. Hancox. Mr. Gaudet, chairman of the Charlottetown Board, will be unable to attend the meeting, to begin Sunday at Sydney, S., because of other affairs.

Other delegates attending from here include Charles Moffatt, secretary manager of the Charlottetown Board; Capt. Claude Hunter, Rupert Godfrey and B. Graham Rogers. Delegates from other Island Boards of Trade will also be attending.

Two resolutions are to be presented to the meeting by the Charlottetown Board. The first of these deals with a request to be put to the New Brunswick government concerning the paving of a five-mile stretch of road from Tignish to Baie Verte in New Brunswick. The resolutions point out that people travelling from Nova Scotia and P.E.I. and using this shore road from Pūgwash to Baie Verte a convenience especially in the winter months and the paving of this five-mile stretch would add to the convenience.

The other resolution deals with looking into the possibility of setting up a system of standard highway signs for the Maritime provinces.

The meeting which gets underway Monday morning will be chaired by the MPBT president, J. M. Murphy, Truro.

Executive Director Addresses Graduates

SUMMERSIDE — The executive director of the Prince County Welfare Agency here, Lorne Murphy, told Misouche Regional High School's 1966-graduating class that their education does not terminate with the acquisition of a grade 12 diploma or a university degree. "Your education," he said, "is the sum total of your life-long experiences and will continue until you die."

Stating that the only way to achieve happiness is to strive for the happiness of others, he said "we have only a short time to live; let us use this time wisely — for the benefit of mankind."

Looking at some of society's problems today, he pointed to the slums of Harlem where 43 per cent of the newborns are illegitimate and to the prisons where 85 per cent of the inmates have an education equivalent to less than grade 5 and where 60 per cent of them are repeaters.

He said that society is partly to blame for these problems and urged the graduates to "bring some of your drive, your energy and your education to help your less fortunate."

"Brotherhood was not so important in the time of our fathers," he added, "but today it is a necessity if we are to survive."

20 STUDENTS

A total of 20 students graduate this year and Rev. J.D. Kelly, Misouche parish priest, who thanked the speaker, noted that half of the graduates were from his parish. He felt that this must be a record. The chairman of the school board, B.W. DesRoches, introduced Mr. Murphy.

Western Man Assessed Fines

SUMMERSIDE — A young Summerside man, Donald Joseph Arsenault, was fined by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald on two charges of damage to property.

He was charged with breaking an aerial on a car and kicking the side of a second car. On each charge he was fined \$50 and costs or thirty days with the sentences to run consecutively if the fines are not paid.

In addition he was ordered to make restitution to the amount of \$7.95 for the aerial and \$16.50 for the damage to the second vehicle or serve an additional 10 and 15 days respectively.

The magistrate told the accused that if he ever appeared before him again he would be given a stiff jail term.

Testimony was heard in the case of Ernest Joseph MacMillan, CFB Summerside, who had entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of impaired driving at an earlier hearing.

The charge was laid on April 30 after the accused lost control of his vehicle on Granville Street North and went into the ditch. The investigating officer, RCMP Constable W.S. Piment, who laid the charge, was the lone crown witness.

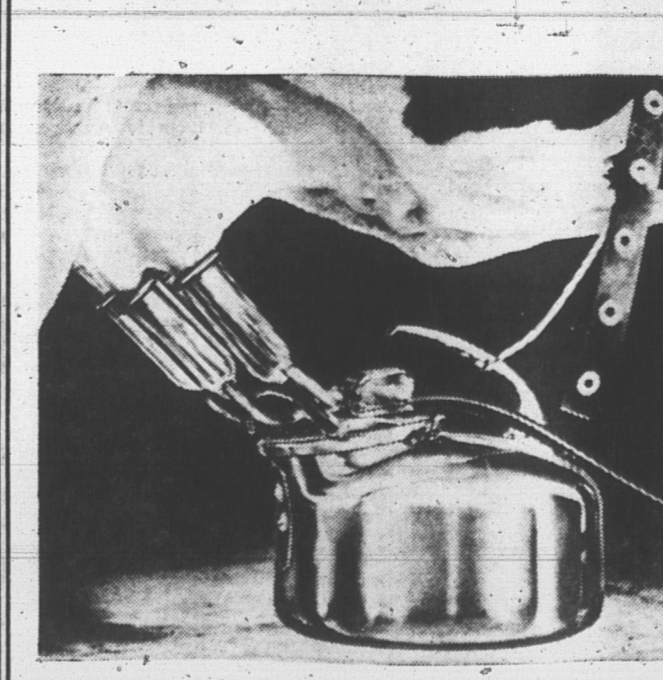
