Pleads Not Guilty In Assault Case

An Albany man, George Edward Curtis, pleaded not guilty to a charge of assault causing bodily harm and was remanded to Dec. 6 to fix a date for trial with bail to stand by Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queen's County Magistrate's court yesterday. Lester O'Donnell was counsel for the accused.

Owen Eric MacEwen, Crapaud, charged with obstructing a police officer pleaded not guilty to the charge and had his case adjourned to Jan. 5 to fix a date for trial. The police officer was Const. Allan Burchill of the Borden Detachment of the RCMP. Counsel for the accused is Gordon Tweedy.

In the absence of J. P. Nicholson, Bert Campbell acted for Robert Francis Campbell, Westmorland, charged with escape from lawful custody. The accused was remanded to Dec. 3 to fix a date for trial. Magistrate Johnston warned that if the accused is not present on that date his bail will be cancelled.

An Alberton South man, Eric John Fraser, was fined \$10 and costs or five days on a charge of possession of small oysters under the Fisheries Act. The oysters measured less than three inches.

Two accused were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days on a charge of illegal possession of liquor.

Automobile Insurance Rate Increases Seen

A continuing increase in the average cost of automobile insurance claims will cause an increase in insurance rates in Prince Edward Island in 1966.

A survey by All Canada Insurance Federation shows that most insurance companies will increase their rates by an average of 12.5 per cent, effective Jan. 1. Some companies may make rate adjustments, if any, later in the year.

According to government statistics on which rates are largely based, the average cost of insurance claims in Prince Edward Island has increased by 47 per cent since 1961 and frequency of claim has increased by 23 per cent during the same period.

Rates will increase in all parts of Canada.

Increases will go into effect when policies come up for renewal next year. Full details regarding rates for individual motorists will soon be in agents' hands.

Insurance rates vary widely across the country according to the accident frequency and cost within a given area. Rates are generally highest in or near cities and lowest in rural areas. However, in some remote areas collision insurance, which pays for damage to the driver's own car, often costs more. High frequency of one-car accidents, coupled with higher repair costs, results in higher insurance premiums.

LOWER RATES
Insurance rates are lowest for those car owners who, according

to accident statistics, are least likely to get into an accident. If an owner is under 25 years of age, or has a male driver under 25 using his car occasionally, or if he drives to work, uses his car for business or has had an accident within three years, his statistical likelihood of becoming involved in an accident increases and his insurance date rises accordingly.

ELIMINATE WARBLE FLIES

The fall treatment for Warble Fly Control is simple

A mixture of one ounce Ruelene to three ounces water is used. The mixture is poured on the back of cattle.

One ounce of mixture is used per hundred pounds of body weight. Eight ounces is the maximum dose.

A single treatment with Ruelene in the fall usually provides seasonal louse control.

Out losses due to Warble Fly Damage—Treat Cattle with Ruelene before December 10.

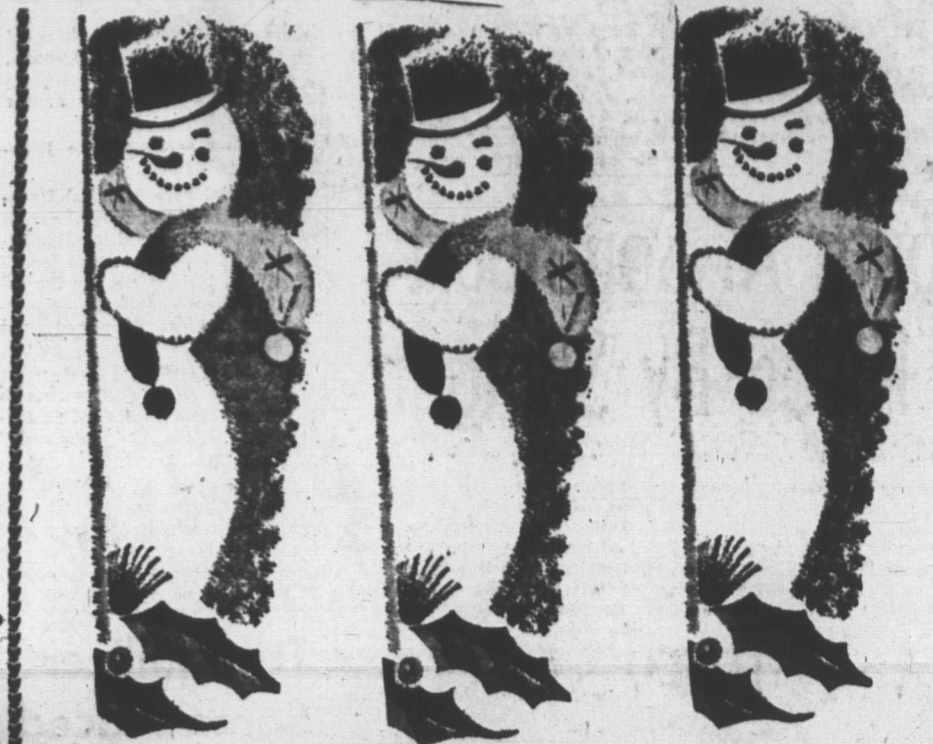

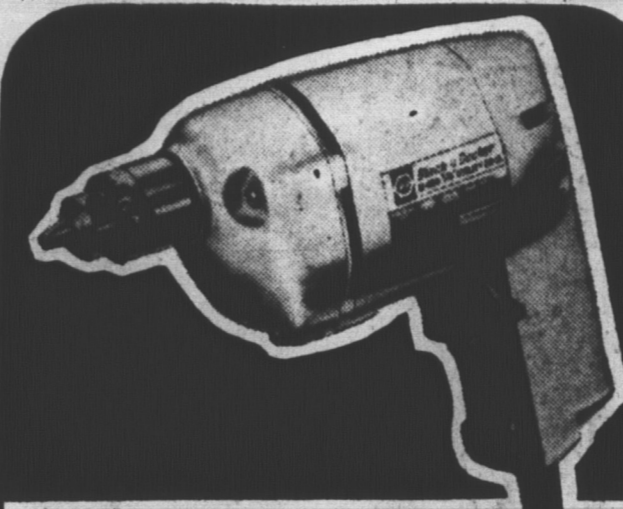

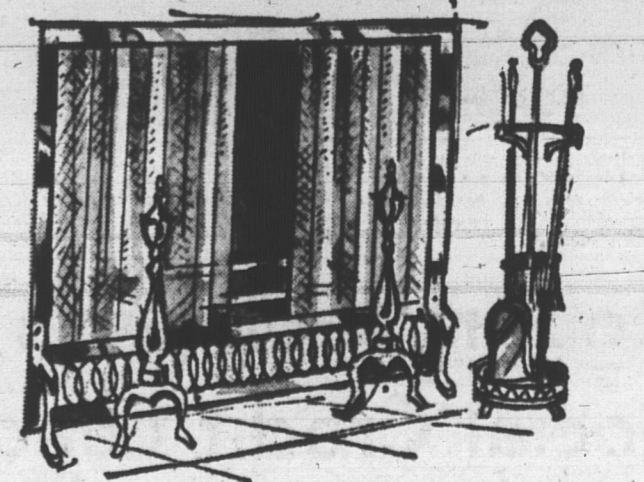
