MONTAGUE — The Montague Town Council will present a resolution to the provincial government urging the rebuilding of the highway between Cherry Valley and Montague.

The resolution was adopted at last night's meeting of the Montague council with Mayor Bruce H. Holmes presiding.

All members of the council will endeavour to be on hand for the presentation of the resolution. It points out that this highway which was paved in 1938 and 1939, is now almost beyond repair.

The breaks in the pavement are so bad in places that the highway is almost impassable, it was stated. It is the main link between the Montague area and Charlottetown.

## Dairymen Are Given Advice On Increase In Production

Higher butterfat production per cow rather than higher production through increased size of dairy herds was advocated yesterday by Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae.

Stating the results of this province can sell millions more pounds of milk than it produces, Mr. MacRae said "we have a market on our doorstep and anyone interested in increasing the size of his dairy herd will be given the same assistance from my department that it received by the beef producers."

Best producers receive a subsidy of \$100 per carload on beef cattle imported.

Mr. MacRae said, however, he felt it would be better for the dairy industry if farmers raised the butterfat production of their present herds.

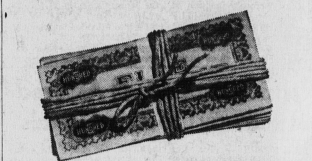
"The average butterfat production of purebred cattle," he said, "is from 375 pounds to 400 pounds, while the average of all cattle in the province is 250 pounds. If average production could be raised we would get much more butterfat without increasing our costs."

The minister emphasized, he did at the last session of the Legislature, that dairy farmers should not rush into increased production without keeping an eye on the federal government's consumer subsidy on butter. "The price," he said, "is guaranteed until next April, but no one knows what may happen to the guarantee after that date."

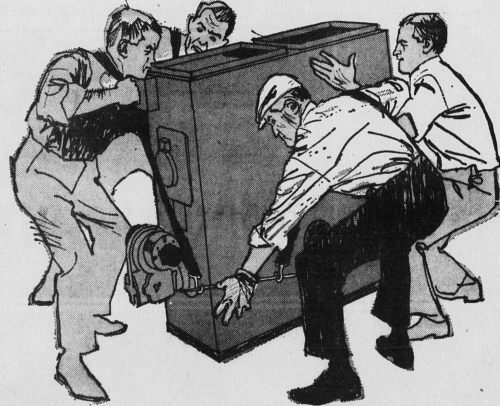
**COASTER SINKS**
