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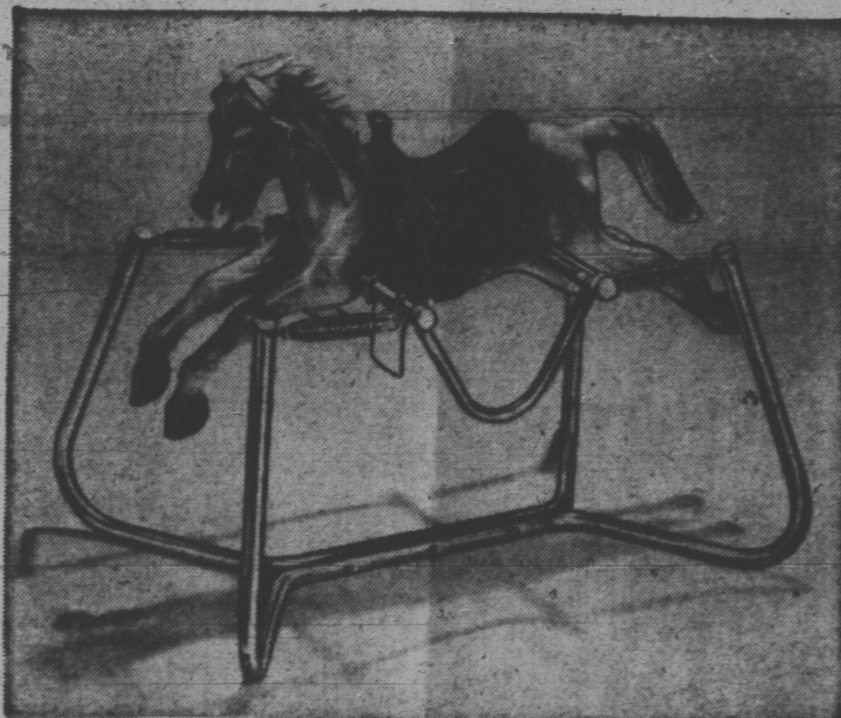

Sentenced For Break At Horseman's Club, S'side

SUMMERSIDE - Two men pleaded guilty to escaping jail and break, enter, and theft at the Horseman's Club here, both on October 5, when they appeared before Judge Walter E. Darby in Judge's criminal court for Prince County.

Joseph Roy Bernard of Wellington, and John Joseph Aubin Gallant of Howlan, had been committed earlier at preliminary hearings into the charges.

Both changed pleas from not guilty to guilty when they appeared before Judge Darby.

Bernard was sentenced three months for escaping jail and two months on the charge of break, enter, and theft, both sentences to run concurrently, and to be served at Prince County Jail.

Allan Joseph Cormier, St. Eleanor's, and Albin Keith Williams of Springhill, P.E.I., appeared before Judge Darby, and their trial was set for next Monday.

J. Melville Campbell was appointed counsel for both accused by the court.

Alfred Joseph Cahill had his trial set down for Tuesday, with J. Melville Campbell also appointed for the accused. Cahill is charged with stealing a chest of silverware from R.T. Holman Ltd.

Convicted In Town Police Court

SUMMERSIDE - In town police court yesterday morning Charles Boyfield Reeves, 24, of Ellerslie, was remanded for sentencing following trial before Magistrate R.S. Hinton.

Originally charged with the theft of a watch, valued less than \$50, the charge was changed to possession of stolen property. He was found guilty as charged.

Appearing for the crown were Arthur Fife, an elderly man, who owned the watch; his friend and room-mate in a Summerside hotel, Richard Banks, and local Jeweller, Wallace Moase.

Reeves gave evidence in his own behalf, stating that he didn't know the watch was stolen, and that his companion had taken the watch into the jewellery store.

Magistrate Hinton, in reserving sentence until next Thursday, told the accused of the seriousness of the charge, and warned him that he must quit drinking. (The accused said that he and two companions drank two quarts of wine prior to the alleged theft.)

Martin Gallant of Summerside, was acquitted on a charge of driving without due care and attention. Clarence Gallant of Egmont Bay was the only defence witness in the trial this morning, and told the court that he had been driving on the day in question and not Martin Gallant. Subsequently, Clarence Gallant pleaded guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention, and was fined \$10 and costs.

Francis Perry of Toronto and Miscouche pleaded guilty to screwing tires and was fined \$10 and costs.

Provincial San Accredited

Full accreditation status has again been awarded to the Provincial Sanatorium and Rehabilitation Centre following reports of a survey conducted by Dr. J.P. LaPlante, representative of the Canadian Council on Hospital Accreditation, in June 1966. They were assessed by the Board of Directors of the Council.

In making this announcement, Provincial Health Minister, the Hon. Keir Clark, expressed great satisfaction that the government hospitals, named above had once again complied with the standards approved by the Canadian Council on Accreditation for patient care with respect to physical plant, administration, diagnostic and treatment facilities, and the supervision, review and analysis of clinical work by an organized competent staff.
