15 Million Students in U.S. Faced With Reading Problem

MELBOURNE, Fla. (AP)—Some 15,000,000 school children in the United States are so poor readers that they don't understand their textbooks. They founder and fall back. They miss the important points, the pushed-out, the unemployed and unemployable, frustrated and hopeless. At best they mark time in industrial arts or home-making classes washed along from grade to grade without profiting.

The remedial program of Melbourne started with six classes of 25 students each. It was Phase I English—for those reading only to the Grade 4 level. Phase II English, for those reading at the Grades 4, 5 and 6 level, started last August. In Phase I, class size is kept to a maximum of 12 students. The remedial program of Melbourne is on individual instruction. Movement between phases is flexible, although most move up from Phase I to Phase II at their reading improves. The remedial courses are counted as regular English courses for the students. The Phase I program goes back to the Grade 1 level if necessary, and there is heavy emphasis on phonics—learning the sounds of letters and then learning to read by sounding the words.
