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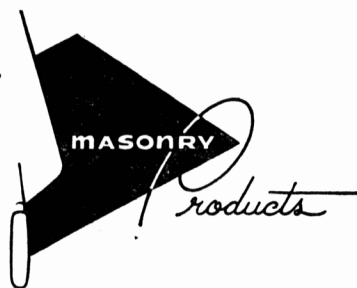

**Effects Of Sales Tax Cuts To Vary**

OTTAWA, (CP)—Some of the excise and sales tax cuts in Finance Minister Abbott's budget may be passed to the consumer, but the effect on retail prices will vary.

The reason, government officials say, is that excise and sales taxes—the main target of the budget's tax cuts—are applied at the manufacturer's level.

Whether the full cut goes to the public will depend on individual wholesalers and retailers.

Large items, such as electrical appliances exempted from the 15-per-cent excise tax, probably will have an immediate price reduction since the exemption is immediate.

For other items such as candy and soft drinks, where the excise tax has been reduced only partly to 10 from 15 per cent, the saving is expected to be too small to be passed on in the form of a penny saving in retail price.

On a toaster selling at \$30, for instance, the 15-per-cent excise tax represents \$4.50, assuming a 50-per-cent margin of profit between the factory and retail price.
