Opening lead—six of diamonds.
There are two fairly common situations that keep cropping up in the play of the dummy. One is the safety play where declarer takes the necessary measures to insure his contract.
The other is the recurring problem of whether it is better to finesse or play for the drop when declarer and dummy together have nine cards in a suit, missing Q-x-x of that suit. The general rule in this case is to cash A-K of the suit, but because it is mathematically a close proposition to begin with, declarer may frequently switch over to the finesse for good and sufficient reasons.

One of the most remarkable hands on record is this one where declarer can knock off two birds with one stone. Both the question of a safety play and the problem of a missing queen are involved at one and the same moment.
South found himself in six hearts on the sequence of bids shown. The contract was an excellent one. It would make if West had the king of spades, and it would make if a club loser could be avoided.
The diamond lead was ruffed and two rounds of trumps were taken. The king of clubs was cashed and another club led towards dummy, West playing the ten. To finesse or not to finesse was the question.
Declarer finessed, and made the contract. But it was not a lucky guess. The finesse absolutely guaranteed the contract, win or lose.
Suppose it had turned out East had the queen. What could he return? Only a spade or a diamond, since he could have no hearts or clubs.
If East played a spade into other spade loser would go on dummy's fifth club.
Or if East, instead, returned a diamond, South would discard spade, ruff in dummy, and claim the rest.
So the club finesse, with nine cards of the suit, turned out to be also a safety play.

Wants Russia To Help Police Skies

WASHINGTON (AP) — State Secretary Dulles proposed Thursday that Russia join in policing the skies to make sure outer space is dedicated solely to peace.
Soviet Premier Bulganin, he said, should "jump at this chance" to ease tension before control of space weapons becomes impossible.
"I certainly hope from the depths of my heart," Dulles said, "that the emphasis President Eisenhower put on this in his letter (to Bulganin last Sunday) will find a response by Bulganin."
Dulles issued his new challenge in answering questions after a speech at a National Press Club luncheon. He focused on prospects for East-West negotiations and spoke against any belief that a summit conference could end the cold war "by a stroke of a pen."
The secretary made these other statements:

Bulganin is chairman of the Soviet council of ministers.
By "proper conditions," Dulles said he wants advance assurance that "significant topics" would be discussed by the heads of government with a good prospect of agreement on important points.
NEW LOW-LEVEL TALKS
He reaffirmed his view that lower-level talks are needed first to discuss specific problems such as German unity and disarmament to avoid turning a summit meeting into another "episode in the cold war."
Soviet leaders, he said, would like to use the summit talks to create an illusion of peace which would then cause free peoples to relax their common defence measures.
"Nothing," he added, "could be more folly for us than to act on the belief that all our danger could be ended by peaceful platitudes proclaimed from the 'summit' by heads of government."

1. Communist China should be barred from any summit meeting because it is not an "indispensable or proper" authority to discuss world problems. The United States has no reason to change its policy of refusing diplomatic recognition to the Peking regime, but would not hesitate to meet with its representatives if it would serve peace.
2. U.S. prestige "stands higher than ever before" with allied governments but he "can't say the same for public opinion... which is somewhat misled."
3. The United States is ready to join European countries in giving financial aid to France provided it "gets its house in order at home."
4. The Hungarian revolt demonstrated communism's "fatal defect"—an inability to blot out man's yearning for freedom. This would lead to "the undoing" of communism "in a decade or more."
Dulles, who has spoken frequently of dangers of negotiations with the Russians, sought to put his position in a positive light. He said:
"President Eisenhower's letter to chairman Bulganin should dissipate once and for all any impression that the United States does not want to negotiate, or is afraid to negotiate with Soviet rulers.
"The truth is quite the contrary. We do want a summit meeting, provided the proper conditions obtain."

Plan Gypsum Mine In Quebec

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — The National Gypsum Co., said Thursday it will start mining asbestos in Quebec next summer. It plans to sell about 25 per cent of the output in Europe.
The company said the \$5,000,000 plant now being built at Thetford Mines, Que., will be able to process 3,000 tons of ore a day. The deposit is expected to last 100 years.
A large part of the output will be shipped to gypsum's building material plants, which now buy asbestos from other sources, to make shingles and wall siding.
The venture is gypsum's first in the mining of asbestos. It is also the first time the company has planned to sell any of its products in Europe.
GREATEST PROGRESS
TORONTO (CP)—The Ontario Hydro — Electric power commission reports progress on the St. Lawrence power project in 1957 was the greatest in the project's three-year history. The project now is 80-per cent complete, the commission said Wednesday, and will produce its first power in July. It is scheduled to be completed in 1960.

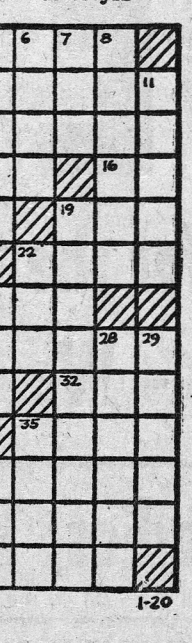
