The Chaldeans (or Babylonians) would be hated as cruel tyrants, God told Habakkuk, as "plunderers of many nations," savagery of cities, killers of men. They, in turn, would meet their own chastisement, all in God's time.

Despite the dire forebodings of his city's doom, Habakkuk gave thanks and praise to God, saying he would rejoice in Him despite all privations and sufferings that might come.
