POOR PEOPLE.—The number of persons in the Halifax poor asylum on September 1st was 261. Of these 131 were men, 123 women and 7 children. During the month of August 29 were discharged, 25 were admitted, 2 died and there was one birth.

HAY PRESS.—The new patented hay press brought here by Whitley & Sons from the Albany, N. Y., works, was started yesterday. Quite a number of people were gathered around the warehouse to see what kind of work it could do. The machine was started with one horse and did some splendid work. For tight pressing and neatness of bale it takes the lead.
