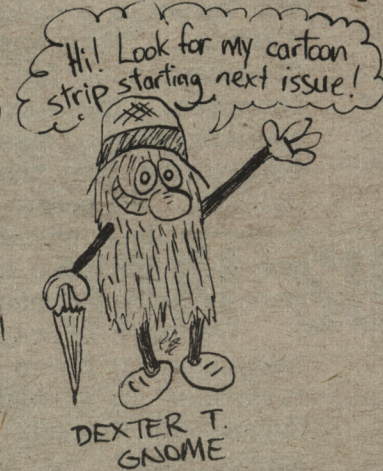
We were between the lights at A&W and the RCMP station when we almost got hit on purpose. Immediately we went to the RCMP and reported what had happened but didn't press charges.
