Among sixty-seven R. C. A. F. personnel leaving Canada on July 15 for service with No. 4 Fighter Wing at Baden-Soellingen, Germany, is Leading Airwoman M. R. MacFarlane, of Lower Beedque. Upon arrival in Baden-Soellingen, the airwomen and airwomen will take up duties with the vanguard of ground crew personnel preparing for the arrival of Sabre-jets from Canada. Three squadrons of F-86s are in final stages of training before hopping the Atlantic to their new NATO base. Arrival of these squadrons at Baden-Soellingen will mark the completion of Canada's Air Division.

Leading airwoman MacFarlane is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur MacFarlane, of Lower Beedque, and has been in the Air Force for two years. Streets recommended for "chips" are: Sydney St. East, Weymouth St., Cumberland, Sydney St. West, Hensley, Pleasant, Victory Avenue, Felling, Richmond, Oriehar, Alley, Bishop, Birchwood, Oriehar, Alley, Douglas, Elm, Ave-Upper Queen, Highland Ave., Ambrose, Green, Spring Park Rd-Ambrose, Park Terrace, Bungalow Place, Brighton Ave., (Ambrose-Greenfield Ave) and Pasmore St. Streets already gravelled or nearing completion, in anticipation of "chip" treatment next Summer are: King St. West, Union, Douglas St., (Spring Park Rd-Upper Queen), Brighton Ave., (Peake-Ambrose, Greenfield Ave., North River Rd., McGill Terrace, Greenfield Ave., (McGill Ave-Green), Green St., (Ambrose-North River Road), Spring St., (Euston-Brighton Ave.), Villa, Victoria St. (Light coat gravel), Valley and Maple St. 114 miles of streets are involved in this treatment with a curb to curb width varying from 19 to 25 feet, requiring 2,425 cubic yards of gravel six inches deep.

Sidewalk Program

The side-walk programme calls for the laying of a mile and a half of cement walk by M. F. Schurr and Ltd., and considerable patching by the city crews. The practice of raising and removing cracked or broken blocks in the cement which is slow and costly, and not always effective, may be abandoned in favor of running tarvia over the damaged portion, and levelling off. A trial section under this treatment has already proved satisfactory.
