

Tigers Lose 6th Straight; Bosox Blank Yankees 4-0

Detroit lost its sixth straight game Friday, bowing to Chicago 4-0 on Jim Rivera's two-run pop double, and Boston's Tom Brewer shut out New York Yankees 4-0 with two singles in American League action.

Milwaukee Braves and Pittsburgh Pirates had to settle for a 2-1 tie when rain washed out their game in the 10th inning. It was the only National League day game. Pittsburgh, still looking for its first victory, got its run on homers by Dick Groat and Roberto Clement off Bob Rush.

The National had three night games scheduled with St. Louis at San Francisco, Chicago at Los Angeles and Philadelphia at Cincinnati. The American night action included Washington at Baltimore and Kansas City at Cleveland.

Rivera, who had entered the game in the sixth as a pinch-runner, delivered the hit in the eighth that sent the Tigers reeling to their sixth straight setback. The victim was Ray Narleski, who with Don Mossi was supposed to have bolstered the Tigers' bullpen. It was Narleski's third defeat.

The lead see-sawed as Detroit scored in the second and Norm Cash put Chicago out front with a three-run homer in the fourth. Eddie Yost's two-run homer in the fifth tied it at 3-3 and each team scored in the sixth, the Tigers on Al Kaline's leadoff homer. Earl Torgeson, batting for the slumping rookie Johnny Callison, drove in the tying run for the White Sox.

Dick Donovan started by Roldo Airas, the Sox' new relief ace, was the winner. Frank Lary and Tom Morgan preceded Narleski for Detroit.

Brewer, recuperating from a bout with the flu, got revenge for his opening day defeat at the hands of Bob Turley when he turned back the Yanks. Brewer lost to Turley at New York Sunday when Turley threw a two-hitter.

NINE-HIT ATTACK
Pete Runnels had a double and two singles and Gene Stephens knocked in two runs in the nine-hit attack on Turley. Fine fielding by Jackie Jensen and Stephens helped Brewer get down the last 15 men to face him.

The rain came down in Milwaukee with the Braves out front 2-1 in the sixth. But it let up in the eighth while the Pirates tied the score on Clement's homer. In that eighth, Don McMahon relieved Rush and put down a serious threat with two on and nobody out. Hank Aaron's running catch on Don Hoak's sinking liner near the foul line and his throw that doubled Vern Law off first was the big defensive play.

Aaron opened the eighth with a double and took third on an infield out but, the ball failed when Del Crandall hit into his third double play of the afternoon. The game must be replayed from the start.

Arcaro Goes After 4th Win

NEW YORK (AP) — Eddie Arcaro goes after his fourth consecutive victory in the \$75,000-added Wood Memorial aboard First Landing today at Jamaica. A convincing triumph would make the colt favorite for the Kentucky Derby.

First Landing, the champion two-year-old of 1958, will meet eight rivals in the mile and one eighth wood — final major New York race before the \$125,000-added Derby at Louisville May 2.

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH



In sunny Carolina last week, a world's record was made at Santa Anita track when the seven-year-old pacer, Plantation Chief, won in 1:58 — equalling the world's mark for geldings and setting up a new track record for the Arcadia track. The driver was Russell Valles Key, who was the driver of three other winners that same afternoon.

Plantation Chief raced as a six-year-old last year and took a record of 2:01 3/5, and had seven first, four seconds and nine thirds, winning his last two starts. His season's winnings totalled \$9,334. Of course the Santa Anita track, and weather conditions, were extremely important factors in producing the above record.

A few years ago we had the pleasure of driving the pacer, Golden Broom, in a workout on the Santa Anita track, and was told to let him step the last eighth. When I looked at the watch after getting off the sulky, it registered 1:52 seconds.

At Yonkers Raceway, the picture is quite different, because it is a half-mile track. And with its neighbor, Roosevelt Raceway, it can claim to be one of the fastest in the world. But the weather, at this season, is not too favorable for fast times.

Yet last Friday night, Adios Claire, driven by George Phelan, was the winner of the "Jerry The First" feature race, purse \$13,475, with the mile in 2:04 — the fastest trip of the season for a half-mile track.

There must be plenty of money in New York, as the 30.5% share in attendance wagered \$2,293,000.

POPULAR DRIVER
At Rockingham, New Hamp-shire, half-mile track, the most popular driver is George (Buddy) Reed, of Gorham, Maine, who has 19 trotters and pacers racing there. In 1957, he suffered a broken ankle and was sidelined for most of the season, but late in the fall he hopped back on the sulky and ended up with 26 wins.

Last year he competed in 470 races and won 71 times, first, 75 times second and 56 times third. He has a vast breeding farm and expects to produce some noteworthy trotters and pacers.

One of the most successful drivers in the United States is Jimmy Cruise, who has been following the trotters and pacers for quite a number of years and always has a nice hunk of money at the conclusion of his campaigns. For instance, in 1958, he had 82 firsts, 90 seconds and 82 thirds, and won \$312,800. Some of the horses he drove were owned by patrons, but quite a number were owned by Jimmy, personally.

Last fall he picked up a pacer called Royal Pastime, with a record of 2:02 4/5, made as a seven-year-old, and with winnings over a long period of time of \$127,392. But last year's portion of it was only \$3,661.

Jimmy paid \$500 for him. He was thin and in poor shape, and gave every evidence of never again being able to meet in battle on the turf the kind of company he had associated with in his younger years. Care, good feed, nice, easy miles and Mimmy's skill brought him out this season as an entirely different-looking horse. His lameness was gone, and he would shake his head, grab the bit and show a lot of speed.

A few nights ago he started at Yonkers Raceway, and over a rain-soaked track was a winner. Among the drivers racing at Yonkers is Sacher L. Werner. Werner was born in Austria on December 8, 1898, but moved to the United States after World War II when the Communists overran that country.

Last year he made 90 starts, was 14 times first, 11 times second and 10 times third with stable winnings of \$23,711.

This woiit nyshowircvannan This year, in conversation with Erwin Grossman of the New York Herald-Tribune, he said he cannot figure out the New York trotting tracks. "You lose, and they boo," he said. "You win, they still boo!"

In Europe, where he raced during World War II, fans had a more appropriate way of showing their disapproval. In Marseilles, France, they jumped over the fences and pulled the driver out of his sulky which he missed the biggest name in Austrian harness racing before Adolf Hitler brushed him out. He came to the United States in 1942, after driving in France, and was one of the first drivers to be on hand for the opening of Roosevelt Raceway.

In Europe, in those days, he remembers, some of the races were a 1/2 mile in length. "You didn't need any skill for them; every driver was poised with this whip in hand, and at the word 'go' everyone burst for the lead. At the first turn, the ambulances were waiting; there were usually two or three pile-ups every night," he recalled.

Werner sees a great future for harness tracks draw 36,000 Paris, with some five million, gets 70,000. "There is no reason why we, in New York, can't draw 50,000 a night here and break a \$2 million pari-mutuel handle every night."

Werner has 20 head stabled at Yonkers and takes a personal interest in every one of them. He has Dawn's Pride, a six-year-old mare that won a Class "A"

FAVORITE PACER
At Yonkers Raceway last Saturday night, a crowd of 27,925 saw the favorite pacer, Irish 2:00 4/5 win the feature event on the program — the \$5,500 pace — by turning the tables on Bay State Pat that had won in their previous meeting. Bay State finished third with Auntie Bellum second; the track was very slow, and the mile was in 2:07 3/5.

The fastest mile of the night was in the \$3,500 pace won by Eddie Towne, driven by Vern Dancer, with the mile in 2:06 3/5. Billy Haughton didn't make a first, second or third placing in any of the dashes.

The last couple of days have made a remarkable difference in the Charlotte track, because of the favorable weather and the excellent efforts of the caretaker who can be credited with having, we believe, the best track in the Marries at this date.

Between sixty and seventy horses are being exercised over it every day, and most of them we have seen are in remarkable condition, with beautiful, shiny coats, and giving every evidence of careful attention and plenty of exercise.

It is our purpose, in this column, to give a complete, or nearly complete, list of the horses stabled there or being worked over the track, and we begin with the Andrew-Perry stable, whose head trainer is Don Seaman with Roy Barnett as assistant. Maple Leafs Were Robbed!

TORONTO (CP) — Toronto Maple Leafs scored a goal in Thursday night's fourth Stanley Cup playoff game which was not officially recorded, the club said Friday.

Movies of the game, which Leafs lost 3-2 to Montreal Canadiens, showed that winger George Armstrong put the puck through the net behind goalie Jacques Plante early in the third period.

Club officials said the puck seemed to go through the webbing of the net and out the other side. They said the same thing happened in a Jeague game this year.

If the goal had been allowed Leafs would have had a 1-0 lead, which followed by centre Billy Harris' counter a few minutes later, would have made it 2-0 for Toronto.

"I knew that goal was in last night," Leaf general manager Punch Imlach said. "The movies show . . . the puck going into the net followed by the bulge where it hit, about one foot of the ice."

At the time both Armstrong and linemate Dickie Duff protested but the goal judge would not allow the goal.

Leafs trail Canadiens 3-1 in

Last year our Association passed a resolution requiring buck lambs to be discounted \$1.00 per head and lambs with long tails 50c per head. These regulations will be in effect again this year beginning August 1, 1959.

The quality of P.E.I. lambs marketed in 1958 showed a very marked improvement. It is our opinion that the above regulations were responsible for some of this improvement.

The following live grades and weights will be in effect for marketing lambs beginning August 1st, 1959:

1. Castrate all buck lambs intended for market.
2. Dock all lambs.
3. Provide for supplementary pasture this fall to finish lambs after weaning.
4. Market lambs at proper weights; that is, 85 to 110 pounds.
