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Frost Damage Is Heavy To Beans, Tobacco, Corn

The severe frost of Monday morning struck hard at the tobacco, bean and corn crop in the province. It was learned last night from agricultural officials that most of the crops were damaged, in some fields there was no frost at all while in others entire crops were ruined.

The early frost was particularly devastating to some crops which are normally harvested by this time of year, such as beans, it was explained because the late growing season brought on by one of the wettest summers on record.

William Stiers of the department of agriculture said that about half the bean crop at the P.E.I. Frosting Foods plant at Sherwood had been lost, although whether bean fields further west in the Bodega area were also damaged he was not sure.

Mr. Stiers said some corn fields were damaged by frost and the cucumber crop, small to begin with because of the wet summer, was also lost.

TObACCO CRoP
It was learned from David Peacock, provincial department of agriculture, that the tobacco crop, Fanningbrook, was reported to be frost free, and an Alberta report said fields there appear to not be damaged or only slightly damaged. It is still too early to tell.

Alvyn M. Gallant, Rustico, said "the picture is not as bright as this morning," as the frost hit there late Monday morning and fields there appear to not be damaged or only slightly damaged. It is still too early to tell.

DAMAGE SEEN HEAVY
Mr. Peacock said yesterday that it will be a couple of days before damage can be assessed, but it appeared Monday as though the damage was heavy.

Visiting the Greenfield area, he found one 10-acre field at the provincial government farm that apparently "ruined." "We might possibly get something out of the rest of it," he suggested.

There was a complete kill on the farm of Tony Jendryak, Greenfield, and a report from Don Nicholson's farm, Upper Montague, also pictured a heavy loss.

Some of the crop was definitely killed at Marcel Moyer's, Upper Montague, and the same at John Power's in Greenfield. About seven to eight acres seemed to be ruined, though it will take a few days to be sure.

Indirect reports from the farms of Albert Panley and Douglas Rolison, Ocean View, also indicated heavy losses.

There was no immediate word from the Cus and Mac Behren in Glen, William told.

The crop would be about one-half harvested on the average, Mr. Peacock suggested yesterday.

OIL FIRMS WARNED

Attorney-General Melvin MacLeod warned yesterday morning that "some oil companies" may face legal action if they do not take more care in following the province's marked gas tax exemption regulations.

"Our department inspectors have found," he said, "that some gas, sold as exempt from provincial sales tax, is being used in primary industries, did not contain the specific amount of dye to color it sufficiently."

"We have found that on occasion the lack of dye was requested by the persons who were buying from dealers in cases that have been uncovered, the oil companies have been warned that if the practice continues, action will be taken."

Mr. McQuaid explained that unless a proper measure of dye is put into gas that is to be marketed, it is very difficult to distinguish between tax-exempt and regular gas.

An RCMP check for abuses of the province's marked gas regulations has revealed to serious abuses, Mr. McQuaid said.

GENERAL SURVEY
He said the regulations have been in effect over a year, and it was felt that it was time to make a general test for abuses.

"The RCMP," he said, "have been asked to make a special check on the highway a day and gas tested for coloring. A few cases of persons using marked gas were found, but it has not reached serious proportions."

Mr. McQuaid said periodic checks will be made, as well as routine checks, made when

vehicles are involved in an accident. "Recent checks have shown that the system is operating quite well," he added.
