WRECK OF THE MARION.—Messrs. A. Home & Co. received on Saturday evening a cablegram dated St. John's, Nfld., from the owners of the schooner Marion, stating that she was wrecked at Port Mulgrave in Friday night's storm. She was on her way to Charlottetown for a load of produce for St. John's, and she was to have been loaded by A. Home & Co. They have her cargo all engaged.

A PAINTED ACCIDENT.—We hear with regret that a painful accident happened to Lee Warren, son of William Warren, of Tryon, a few days ago. According to the Guardian, young Warren was helping his father load a threshing machine when the drum slipped back in such a manner as to bend his hand back upon his arm. Though no bones were broken the leaders are so badly fractured that it will take some time before the arm is strong. He still suffers considerable pain.

MARRIAGE BILLS.—Mr. Peter McCarron, railway yardmaster at Charlottetown, and Miss Grace Koughan, daughter of the late William Koughan, were united in marriage at St. Dunstan's Cathedral at an early hour this morning. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Father Hogan. The groom was supported by Mr. John Hughes, baggage-master on the Island railway, and the bridesmaid was Miss Ellen Mackenna, of this city. SUDDEN DEATH.—We greatly regret to hear of the sudden death, at Freetown, yesterday, of Miss Maud Lawson, eldest daughter of John A. Lawson, Esq., of the Post Office Department. It seems that Miss Lawson, who has not been in the best of health lately, has been visiting relatives and friends at Freetown during the past two or three months. She was last visiting at the residence of Mr. D. S. Schurman. Yesterday morning about 10.45 she came down stairs all ready for church. Suddenly she dropped to the floor. Kind friends did all in their power to help her, and medical aid was summoned as quickly as possible. But their efforts proved unavailing. Death had claimed another victim. The body was brought to the city this forenoon and will be interred in the People's Cemetery to-morrow afternoon. MIDNIGHT MASS.—There will be High Mass in St. Dunstan's Cathedral at midnight on Christmas Eve. New music has been received for this service, and the choir will be assisted by an efficient orchestra. The sermon on the occasion will be preached by Rev. Dr. Doyle, of Vernon River.

ACCIDENT TO WATER PIPE.—This forenoon while Mr. Frank Creehan was at work tapping the main pipe on Water St. near the railway roundhouse, the tap flew off, and before Mr. Creehan could get out of the trench in which he was at work it filled and his clothing was saturated with water. The gates in that section were shut off, and the flow of water stopped as quickly as possible.

A WOMAN KILLED.—During the prevalence of a northeast gale at Margaree, C. B., on Tuesday last, a house belonging to a man named Peter Doucette was blown down. Mrs. Doucette was in the house at the time and the beams came crashing down on her head. The debris was blown quite a distance, carrying the unfortunate woman along with it. She managed to extricate herself, but before she was so badly injured that she died in a few hours.

BISHOP MACDONALD ADDRESSED.—On the day following the Feast of St. Charles Borromeo, the patron saint of Bishop Macdonald, of Charlottetown, His Lordship was invited to dine at St. Dunstan's College. After the fullest justice had been done to the choice viands prepared for the occasion, His Lordship was presented with an address by the students to which he made an appropriate reply. The vicar choral and Rev. A. McAnlay, Morell, were present at the dinner.

CHILDREN'S DAY.—Yesterday was Children's Day in the First Methodist Church. This day is specially set apart by the Conference for services for the children. In the morning the pastor, Rev. G. M. Campbell, preached an appropriate sermon for the little ones, who occupied the centre pews of the church. In the afternoon they assembled in the basement, and marched, about 400 strong, into the main body of the church, where the offerings for the poor were made, each scholar contributing. The amount thus collected was \$130. An enjoyable hour was spent here, the programme consisting of an address from the pastor, recitations from the children, and vocal and instrumental music.

SHIPMENTS FROM SUMMERSIDE.—The Pioneer says: On Friday, Mr. John Fisher, of Tryon Valley, sent away to Apohaqui 150 sheep and lambs, some of the first-rammed being for breeding purposes. Five horses were also sent away the same day. A span among them was shipped by Messrs. Schurman, Clark & Co. for Miramichi. They were excellent animals. One was purchased from Mr. Richard C. Lee, of Tryon, and weighed 1500 lbs., while the other tipped the scales at 1350, and was brought from Mr. Albert McGowan, of Malpeque. On Saturday Mr. John Layden shipped 198 sheep and Mr. James Kane 108 for St. John. Nine horses were also on board the latter day, seven of them having come up on the express. These were owned by Mr. Wood Avard, and were being taken to Shediac, but the final destination of some of them was the West Indies.
