as part of his crop rotation program. Bearing in mind all of the factors the yield per acre in P.E.I. does not compare unfavourably with that of Maine. As for "new" potatoes, we feel that this is true to a very limited degree and with improved storage techniques, now a reality, Canadian growers can supply our domestic markets with a second-to-none product throughout every month of the year.

TRANSPORTATION
During the past two years there have been no notable changes in Canadian Production consumption, or marketing methods. Maritime producers are now in a somewhat better position as regards transportation due to the recent increase in the subvention under the Maritime Freight Rates Act. This has resulted in a reduction of rates by about one cent per cwt. to most destinations in Central Canada.

RECENT TARIFF CHANGES
Since Reference No. 117 was dealt with, a measure of protection has been provided to the Canadian potato grower through the imposition of a duty under Item 83a but its value has been substantially lessened by the provisions of Item 83b which permits free entry of "new" potatoes January 1st to June 14th. Item 71d was also amended to provide for a 37 1/2 cents per cwt. duty on Seed potatoes, but as already stated this is a necessary measure to prevent Table potatoes being imported under the guise of Seed.

These changes have extended the 1-1/2 months to 6-1/2 months, and period of Tariff protection from have cost us a reduction of 600,000 bushels in our Seed quota and 400,000 bushels in our Table stock quota. If the new quota had been in effect this crop year the Canadian exports would have consisted of both quotas, with the uncertainty and inconvenience to Canadian exporters of the potatoes being subjected to the full duty of 75 cents as soon as 80 percent of either quota was reached.

EFFECTS OF SHORT PERIOD
During the short period in which the new tariff has been in effect our domestic markets have been flooded with surplus distress potatoes from California. The following are a few figures of track holdings in Toronto as reported by the Federal Department of Agriculture.

which in the case of "new" potatoes, the U.S. principal export to Canada, is 1 7/8" minimum until August 31st. On the other hand Canadian exports to U.S.A. are mainly mature potatoes which must meet a size standard of 2 1/4" minimum.

The Prince Edward Island potato producer can see no reason why he should not be accorded the same tariff treatment in dealing with U.S. markets that U.S. growers get in moving their potatoes to the Canadian markets. He also feels that a year-round duty of about 37 1/2 cents per cwt. would provide the growers of each country with a reasonable measure of protection in their home markets.

These imports necessitated a slow-down in our movement to market, as well as a lower price, and resulted in the failure of some P.E.I. and New Brunswick areas to clean up.

Appendix "B" attached, shows prices paid at Toronto for carlots of P.E.I. potatoes in 75 lb. jute sacks. Monthly imports of U.S. potatoes into Canada in hundredweight, for 1956 and 1957, with percentage increase.

The above figures show much higher imports during April 1957 than in April 1956 despite the tariff changes, and points up the ineffectiveness of the present tariff because of the exception provided by Item 71d.

The present tariff on Canadian potatoes entering the U.S. is 75 cents per cwt. except on a quota of 1,900,000 bushels of Seed and 600,000 bushels of tablestock, which quotas are permitted to enter at a duty of 37 1/2 cents per cwt.

The present Canadian tariff is 37 1/2 cents per cwt. with no limit as to quantity, and all new potatoes may enter duty-free from January 1st to June 14th.

In addition to the disparity between these tariffs there is also the difference in size requirements
