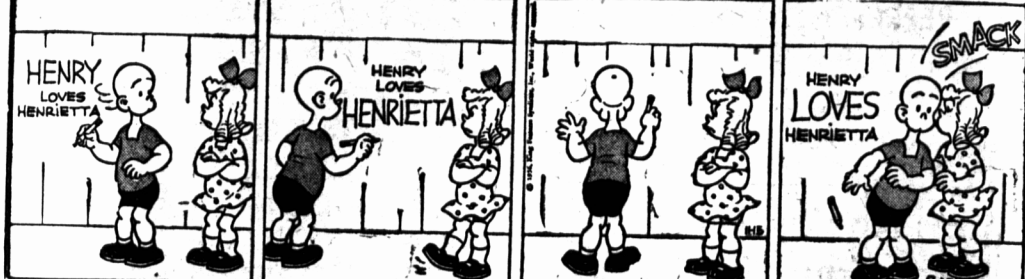

CONTRACT BRIDGE

West dealer.
Both sides vulnerable.

The bidding:

Opening lead - king of diamonds.

It was my pleasure the other day to witness one of our top pairs in action in a rubber bridge game. The manner in which they arrived at their final contract serves as a good example of how a smooth partnership functions.

South's cue bid of two diamonds announced a powerful hand probably void of diamonds, and requested North to choose as trump one of the two unbid suits. North was relieved of the obligation to respond when West intervened with three diamonds and properly passed, since a voluntary bid would have represented a better hand than he had.

Over East's nuisance bid of four diamonds South decided that matters had gone far enough, and he bid four spades. North's five spade bid with his relatively poor hand was a distinct vote of confidence indicating appropriate sensitivity to the enormity of South's bids.

North was approximately aware of South's actual distribution. It did not seem likely that the four spade bid could be based on less than a six card suit. The excellent trump support, the doubleton heart and the potential value of the queen of clubs all added up to impressive features which a casual look at his thirteen cards would not reveal.

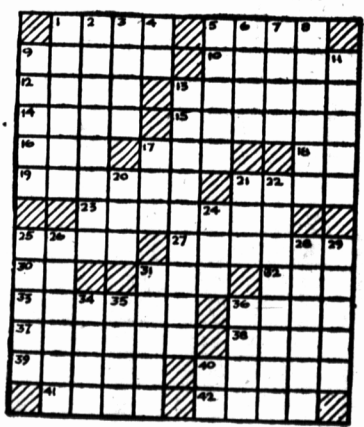
South's final bid, while recognizing the warning implicit in North's pass of three diamonds, was a calculated risk. The chief concern was whether a club lead would defeat the contract. He presumed, though, that North had also considered the danger of a club lead. All in all, he decided the slam was profitable.

The play was relatively simple. Declarer ruffed the diamond lead. The three trumps that were missing, if they were all in one hand, did not figure to be in West's hand, which was marked on the bidding to contain great length in the minor suits.

A low spade to the king enabled declarer to pick up East's three trumps. The ace of hearts, was forced out and three of dummy's clubs were discarded on South's good hearts, thus eliminating the club loser.

Federal Dept. Is Rebuked

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—The municipal council Tuesday rebuked the federal transport department for turning down an invitation to attend a meeting here Wednesday night to discuss mass unemployment at the Saint John Dry Dock Co. Ltd.

The council voted to send a telegram urging reconsideration of his stand to Transport Minister Marler who earlier said he would be unable to attend the meeting of government business, industrial and union representatives.

A telegram from the transport minister said he did not "think any useful purpose would be served by sending a representative of my department."

"The Canadian maritime commission," he continued, "is fully aware of the situation at the Saint John dry dock and is making every effort to see whether it is possible to find some work which could be allocated to it."

Councillor John Chard said the dry dock is "useless" unless it receives government contracts. Lack of them is driving workers to Upper Canada where shipyards are busy.

The dry dock working force has been reduced to 350 from 1,000 men in recent years. At the height of the Korean and Second World Wars it employed about 1,500 men.
