TOO MUCH WHISKEY.—A Birmingham, Ala., despatch of July 2 says: Howard Russell, seven years old, living at Forest City, near here, had often taken whiskey in medicinal prescriptions and thus acquired a taste for the liquor. His stepmother, fearing he would become a drunkard, attempted to break off the desire for whiskey by giving him a surflet. She furnished him a pint or more and told him to drink it all. He did so, and his death followed in about twenty-four hours, in spite of the efforts of the doctor.

YOUNG HENDERSON ARRESTED.—It would seem that some of the friends of the late Eva Gay, the little girl whose untimely death occurred at Lot 49, on Dominion Day, are not fully satisfied with the finding of the coroner's jury. A criminal information in regard to the girl's death has been laid against George Henderson, who, according to the verdict of the coroner's jury, fired the fatal shot. Henderson was arrested on the morning of Monday, July 1st, and brought before John T. Mellish, Esq., J. P. Mr. A. A. McLean appeared for the Crown. The prisoner was remanded to jail until ten o'clock next Monday forenoon, when the hearing will be proceeded with before Mr. Mellish.

WOMEN ATTACK A BEAR.—A Molus River, Kent Co., N. B., correspondent writes to the Richibucto Review: Brain made one of our back settlers, Roderick McDonald, a visit the other evening. They were attracted by the bellowing of the cattle, the women armed themselves with such weapons as axes and pitchfork and started to meet the foe. They did not go far until they came face to face with a bear, and at once attacked him. He killed two of the cattle before he was forced to leave. Such bravery is seldom seen. Few men would have attacked a bear in the manner those women did.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, July 4.

James Isbester, the well-known Ottawa contractor, has been appointed Superintendent of Construction of the Hudson Bay Railway.

The Oka Indians, having declined to accept the advice of the Government to remove to the Muskoka Reserve, selected for them, have been notified not to expect further aid from the Department.

The Dominion Rifle Association has issued a notification that all non-commissioned officers and men desiring to compete in the annual matches, must have performed the last annual drill of their corps.

Irregularities have been discovered in connection with the management of the Granville Canal during the regime of the last superintendent and an investigation has been ordered. Walter Shanley, M. P., is suggested as Chief Engineer of Canals.

Ministerial Movements.

HALIFAX, July 4.

Cabinet Ministers Tupper, Colby, Dewdney and Haggart arrived to-day from their tour of inspection of the Oxford and New Glasgow, and Cape Breton railways. They are pleased with the construction of the former road, and the progress being made on the latter. This afternoon the ministers were given an excursion on Halifax harbor by the Junior Liberal-Conservative Clubs, which included a lunch on the grounds of T. E. Kenny, M. P., on the banks of the North West Arm.

More French Outrages.

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., July 4.

Trustworthy news received here is to the effect that further outrages occurred at Port au Port, on June 23rd. The facts telegraphed by Morrison, Mr. Baird's lawyer state that two French fishing vessels were there and forty Newfoundlanders were seizing. The captain of the French war ship came, seized and carried away one seine, destroyed another and drove all the Newfoundland vessels out of the harbor. French fishermen cut lobster trawls and robbed the traps. The indignation of the Newfoundlanders is great.

Changing the Boundary Line.

OTTAWA, July 4.

Word has come from the Northwest that the United States Survey have established the 141st meridian, which forms the boundary line between Canada and Alaska, twenty-eight miles further east than it is generally supposed to be. This will transfer a long stretch of the gold-bearing district of Yukon to the United States, and will also place the Hudson Bay Company's post of rampart house outside of British territory which lead to the closing of the post, as the Hudson Bay Company's claim is not recognized in Alaska territory.

Failures in Nova Scotia.

HALIFAX, July 4.

There were 45 failures in Nova Scotia for the first six months of the year with liabilities of \$217,000. This is the smallest amount of liabilities in a similar time since Dun Wiman & Co. kept a record of Nova Scotia failures.

Royalty on the Move.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., July 4.

Prince George is expected here on July 19th in the Thrush with the Bellerophon and the Buzzard. A grand ball has been arranged, the Government vowing \$1,000 and the Merchants subscribing \$1,000.
