CPGA Entrants Find Course Hard

By W. R. WHEATLEY MONTREAL (CP) — Despite the usual pre-tournament optimism of swarms of golfers it was hard to find Tuesday any who would predict that the winner of the 1965 Canadian Professional Golfers' Association championship will break par for the 54-hole journey, a chore better than 210.

And the reason is the tough Royal Montreal course, over which the record field of 193 has been toiling at practice rounds for a couple of days to sharpen up for a slice of \$15,500 prize money.

With a pro-amateur tournament on the program today, the CPGA title chase gets underway Thursday and ends Saturday. If there is a tie there will be a full-dress 18-hole playoff Sunday.

Royal Montreal's course for this week's play—the tougher of the club's two courses—is a 6,740-yard layout with a par 70. If that doesn't make the par-breaking tough enough, there are five awesome water holes plus greens with narrow necks and yawning sand-traps.

LAYOUT NEW This is the first time for a professional tournament at the club's new home, near Ile Bizard.

A knot of veteran professionals, finishing a practice round, all said no one would beat 210 and the winner will be several strokes higher. This group, all CPGA champions at one time or another, included Gordie Brydon of Toronto, Dick Borthwick of Hamilton, Jules Juot and Stan Horne of Montreal, and Henry Mariell of Edmonton.

Alvie Thompson of Toronto, the 1962 winner, felt the same way. Al Balding of Toronto, however, figured "anything might win."

"It's a real championship course and it's a tough par 70," said Balding, the winner two years ago at Edmonton where the previous record field of 152 was set.

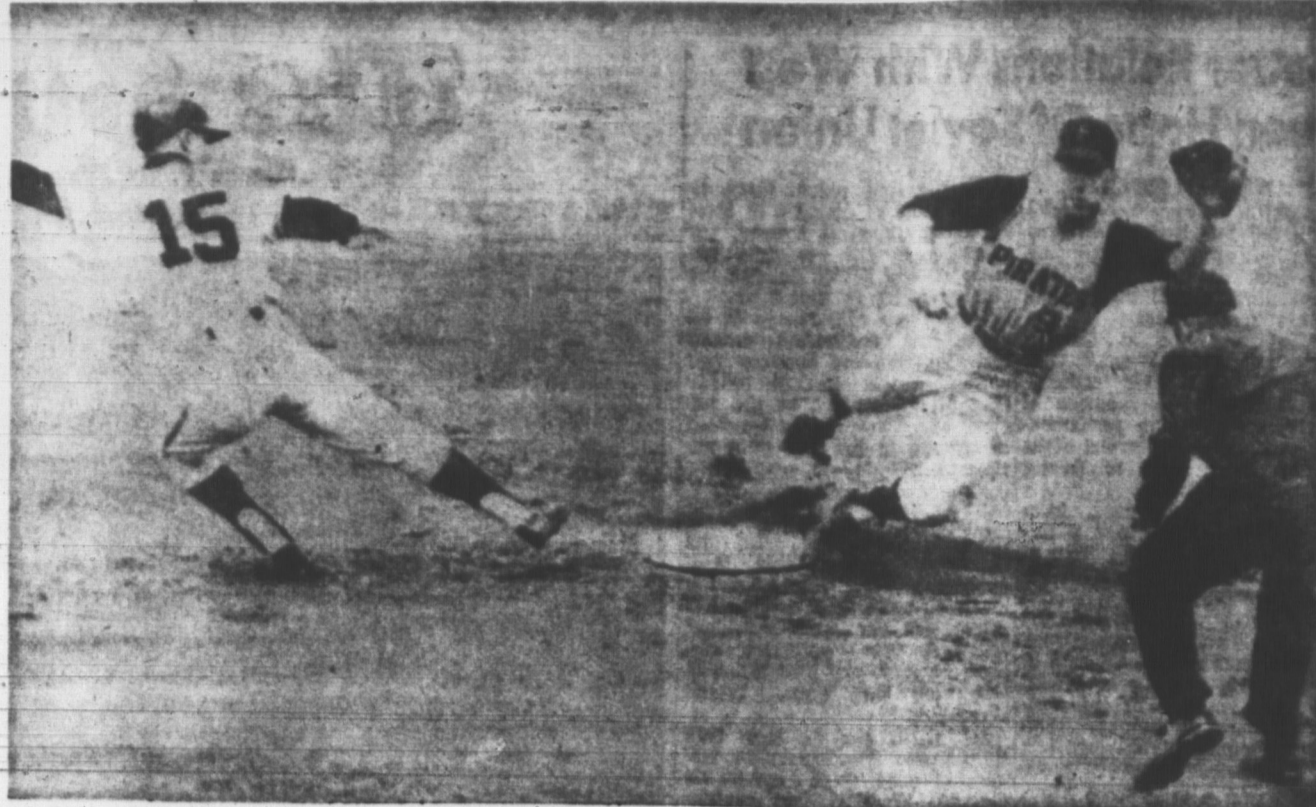

Alberta Willingdon Team Wins Cup By Nine Strokes

By WALTER KREVENCHUK WINNIPEG (CP) — Alberta, sparked by Calgarians Keith Alexander and Bob Wylie, won the Willingdon Cup inter-provincial team golf matches Tuesday for the third time in six years.

Alberta's four-man squad covered the 36-hole event in 600 strokes, nine less than Ontario. Manitoba finished third with 611 and defending champion Saskatchewan, which had held second spot through 27 holes, faded to 612 and fourth place.

British Columbia grabbed fifth place with 620, Quebec and Nova Scotia tied for sixth with 625, a combined New Brunswick - Prince Edward Island team was eighth with 645 and Newfoundland, appearing in the event for the first time, placed last with 703.

Alberta, whose earlier triumphs were in 1960 and 1963, led throughout the two-day event, taking a two-stroke lead over Saskatchewan after nine holes, boosting the margin to eight strokes after 18 and holding the eight-stroke lead after 27.

LED BY ALEXANDER Alexander, 1960 Canadian amateur champion, led the way with a 70-75-145 over the tough, windswept 5,573-yard par 37-35-72 Pine Ridge course.

Wylie, a former Alberta open and amateur champion, scored 74-73-147.

Wylie and Alexander, members of the Alberta team that

finished second behind Saskatchewan last year, were ably supported by Doug Silverberg of Calgary, 75-75-150, and Ray Rhoades, of Edmonton, 77-81-158.

Ontario, a 16-time winner of the Willingdon Cup, entered the final nine holes Tuesday in third place seven strokes behind Saskatchewan, but climbed the ladder on a pair of sparkling 73s by Nick Westlock of Toronto, defending Canadian amateur champion, and Gary Cowan of Kitchener, 1961 amateur king.

Westlock finished with 146 and Cowan with 149. Stu Hamilton of Brampton contributed 79-78-157 and Tom McAllister of Toronto tossed in an 80-77-157.

Saskatchewan's hopes died with Keith Rever of Regina, who wilted to an 81 Tuesday for a two-round 158.

PACED QUEBEC Quebec's best were Pierre Archangeault of Montreal and Henry Setlakwe of Bedford Mines. Archangeault had 78-76-154 and Setlakwe 80-74-154.

Charles Brace, 32-year-old Halifax resident who was a

quarter-finalist in the 1963 Canadian amateur, paced the Nova Scotia team with 73-75-148. His individual score was fourth best among the 36 team members.

Pierre Rossignol, 18-year-old son of former National Hockey League player Roly Rossignol, led the N.B.-P.E.I. unit. The Bathurst golfer finished with 78-78-156.

Dr. Duncan Rice, 1964 amateur champion for his province, was the only member of the Newfoundland team to break 170. He shot 85-78-163.

OTTAWA (CP) — Wayne Ross and Gordon Haskin, both 12 and from the Woodlands Yacht Club near Montreal, took a one-point lead Tuesday in the 16-crew pre-centennial Cadet regatta for boys aged 10-13, sponsored by the Canadian Yachting Association.

In the first four races—three more will be sailed today—the Woodlands crew sailed its 12-foot cadet boat, largest yacht for international junior competitions, to one victory, two seconds, and one 12th place, collecting a total of 59 1/2 points.

In second place was the Manitoba team of Simon Johnson, 11, of the West Hawk Yacht Club, Whiteshell, and Craig Ritchie, 12, of the Falcon Yacht Club, Winnipeg. They placed one, seven, eight and 12 in the four races, for 38 1/2 points.

Stephen Lye and Colin Brodie, both 13 and with the Queen City Yacht Club, Toronto, were third. They collected 57 points with second, third, fourth and 10th-place finishes.

The top-ranking Atlantic team—in sixth place—was made up of Toby Norwood and Billy Buckley, both 11 and with the Royal Nova Scotia Yacht Squadron, Halifax.
