Gas Flows Through First Stretch Of New Pipeline

BINDLOSS, Alta. (CP)—Natural gas from Alberta is scheduled to flow east today, climaxing a 74-year-old story of gas development in the province to its present billion-dollar status in business.

Premier E. C. Manning is to turn a valve in this gas area, 167 miles east of Calgary, to send natural gas glowing through lines of the Alberta Gas Trunk Line Co. Ltd., and into 230 miles of the trans-Canada pipeline in Saskatchewan.

It will be the first time in the history of the province that Alberta gas will be moving east. And the flow is six weeks ahead of schedule.

Natural gas will be "pulled today from three fields and is to be used for testing and purging pipe of the Alberta Gas Trunk Line, established by the provincial government in 1954 as a gathering system to feed gas to the trans-Canada pipeline.

Today's flow will also test and purge construction materials from the trans-Canada line between Regina and the Alberta border

where it connects with the Gas Trunk system.

Premier Manning, with a party of government and industrial leaders, will turn a valve at the metering station here. Gas will flow 16 miles south through 18-inch pipe to a junction with a main 34-inch line about 25 miles from the Saskatchewan border.

It will travel through the line to a point north of Burdall, Sask., where it will join the field gates at the start of Trans-Canada's proposed \$378,000,000 line into Eastern Canada.

Alberta Gas Trunk, its gathering system fanning out over central and southern Alberta, will be feeding on 13 Alberta gas fields where construction is completed in 1960. Still to be constructed this year is 84 miles of 18-inch line running north of here into the Provost field.

Junior Chess Champs Meet

TORONTO (CP) — The world junior chess championship here Aug. 3 to Aug. 17 now shapes up as a 12-entry round-robin tournament, including two Canadians and one each from the United States and nine overseas countries.

The tournament committee, completing its playing arrangements, still uncertain what measure of financial support would be forthcoming from the city of Toronto. The civic board of control on July 17 approved a grant of \$150 which was rejected by committee chairman Bernard Freedman of Toronto as being "not in keeping with the significance of the tournament."

The championship is the fourth biennial tournament. Previous matches were held in England, Denmark and Belgium. Mr. Freedman, a diamond merchant long active in promoting chess in schools, represents the Chess Federation of Canada which undertook to stage the tournament for the world-wide International Chess Federation.

The question of the city's contribution comes up again at the civic board of control meeting Wednesday. The chess committee figures it need at least \$2,400 to provide accommodation and entertainment for the entrants during their two weeks in Toronto, and so far has received about \$1,400.

MUST BE UNDER 20
National junior chess champions are coming from countries as far away as Russia, Finland, South America and the Philippines. The tournament, sponsored by no commercial firms, has received some donations since Mr. Freedman on July 12 warned that lack of support might turn it into "a disgrace for Canada," but more is still needed.

Entrants in this first world junior championship ever played outside Europe must be under 20 years of age.

One of the youngest, 17-year-old Timo Makelainen, reaches New York by steamship on July 29 or 30 planning to come to Toronto by bus. Timo's father, Osmo Makelainen, is editor of the Finlandia Pictorial of Helsinki.

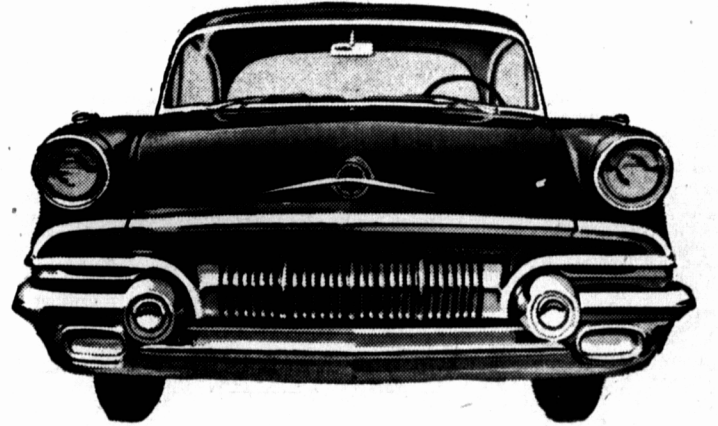

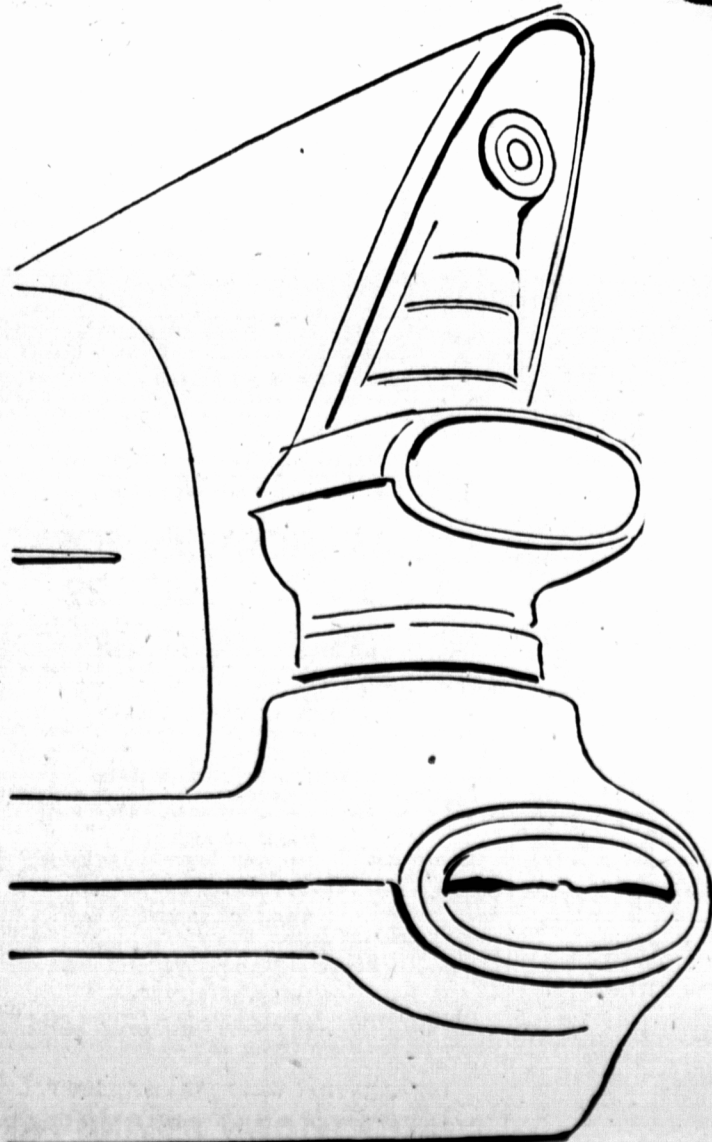
