Interior Of Provincial Bldg. Undergoing Re-decorating Job

Visitors to the Provincial Building this week have noticed a decided change in the appearance of the interior which at present is undergoing a complete facelift. Historic Confederation Chamber which was the first part of Province House to be re-decorated presents a very striking picture and the colour scheme of horizon blue with white trim does much to take away the drabness of the sombre buff and browns with which the interior was painted. The whole picture now is one of brightness and cheeriness which has greatly enhanced the beauty of the venerable structure.

Of keen interest to the many tourists who call annually at Confederation is the beautiful granite ceiling centre piece with its attendant historical significance. This centre piece has been done in natural colours and attracting more than a few camera enthusiasts who wish to preserve a moment of their visit to the "Cradle of Confederation."

The Legislative Chambers will be done in the same colour scheme as will be the corridors of the building upstairs and down. MacDonald and Son painters and decorators from Charlottetown are carrying out the work.

Khrushchev Took Long Gamble On Policy Speech

LONDON (Reuters) - Nikita Khrushchev faced a 5-5 split over his policies in a crucial Kremlin debate, latest Moscow reports indicate.

Confronted with a crisis in which his personal future and the immediate future of Russia was at stake, Khrushchev gambled. He staked all on a direct appeal to the Central Committee of the Soviet Communist party, going over the heads of his Praesidium colleagues.

Khrushchev won. The axe fell and five of his colleagues lost their jobs.

Had the Central Committee vote gone the other way, Khrushchev could have been ousted—and Russia could have swung back to Stalinist policies.

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ARMY BACKED HIM
But the Red army, fearing internal upheavals, swung its weight behind Khrushchev. And army leader Marshal Georgi Zhukov, the present defence minister, got a promotion from candidate (non-voting) member to full member in the party's shuffled and enlarged praesidium, the party's ruling body.

The final Central Committee vote came after a stormy eight-day session which is believed to have analyzed every aspect of home and foreign affairs, including the latest policy declaration by Chinese Communist leader Mao Tse-tung.

The Moscow communique on the central committee session indicates that primary points of conflict between Khrushchev and the "opposition" group led by Vyacheslav Molotov, Georgi Malenkov and Lazar Kaganovich included:

1. Policy toward the West.
2. Policy in Eastern Europe.
3. The Khrushchev plan for industrial reorganization.
4. Incentive plans for Soviet Farmers.

FEAR EASTERN EUROPE
Molotov, the communique indicated, argued against the Khrushchev policy of better relations with the West and with Yugoslavia, and the view that there is more than one road to socialism—evidently on the ground that this might produce more uprisings in Eastern Europe.

The Central Committee meeting which decided to oust Malenkov, Molotov and Kaganovich from Praesidium, also quietly dropped Maxim Saburov from this directing body and reduced Mikhail Pervukhin to the status of a candidate (non-voting) member.
