fore joining the Department of External Affairs, has had considerable diplomatic experience in South American countries and in Europe. He has been Charge d'Affaires of the Canadian Legation in Czechoslovakia since 1950 and was recently replaced there by J.M. 'Takes of Winnipeg.

Other Changes

The announcement gives other changes as follows: Christopher C. Ebberts, 39, native of Montreal and one-time Rhodes Scholar, leaves the Cabinet Secretariat to head the new American Division, embracing the United States, Central and South America.

Herbert Norman, born in Japan in 1909, son of a Canadian missionary, goes to the Information Division as its head, from command of the old American and Far East Division. An outstanding expert on Japan, he will be getting away from purely Asiatic affairs for the first time in years.

Archibald A. Day, 45, native of Collingwood, Ont., leaves the command of the Information Division to go to Paris as Minister - No. 2 man - at the Canadian Embassy there.

Max Wershof, 43, native of Ottawa, steps up to head the Defence Liaison Division.

Chester Ronning, 58, takes over as head of the new Far Eastern Division in an acting capacity, continuing at the same time as head of the Commonwealth Division. He was born in China of Canadian parentage.

Mr. Day succeeds R.M. Macdonnell, 43, in Paris. Mr. Wershof succeeds R.A. MacKay, 58. Both Macdonnell and MacKay have risen to the rank of Assistant Under-Secretary, making them among the top six men at headquarters.

The headquarters hierarchy is a pyramid topped by Under-Secretary or Deputy Minister Dana Wilgress. Immediately below him are Deputy Under-Secretary and three Assistant Under-Secretaries. Below them are the heads of divisions. A good number of these top jobs have changed hands in the past few months.

Fix Assessment Rate For Montague

The assessment rate for the town of Montague was fixed at 80 cents on real estate and 20 cents on personal property at the regular monthly meeting of the Town Council held last night. The rate will therefore remain the same as last year. The assessment list has been completed by the assessors, A. D. MacLure and C. A. Shaw, and passed in to the council. It is understood that the tax notice will be sent out in the near future.

The meeting was presided over by Mayor B. H. Jee and present were Councillors Jamieson, Hessian and Reynolds. Following the reading of the minutes, the bills were presented and ratified. Councillor Reynolds reported that the Library had been done over and was now ready. Councillor Jamieson reported that there were a few traffic problems which would eventually be solved. Councillor Hessian stated that the town finances were sound, and that the collection of this year's taxes would get under way as soon as the notices appeared.

After discussing several other smaller matters the meeting adjourned.

child to enter Grade I must be accompanied by a birth certificate, and that children of parents residing outside the city limits will be admitted only if space is available.

The Board decided, after considerable discussion, to hold a special meeting in two weeks' time to discuss the problem of overcrowding, and the means of dealing with it. In the meantime, the report, now being completed, of a survey made some time ago by Prof. John C. Matthews, a former Islander, now of Fenn College, Cleveland, Ohio, will be studied by the Board. The survey deals both with the immediate needs of the schools as emphasized by the present overcrowding, and with recommendations for future planning.

Mr. Parker indicated that the Matthews report estimated the reasonable maximum capacity of the four city schools at 1680, and the maximum emergency capacity not in excess of 1950.

In his report Mr. Parker also noted that 60 percent of the classes now contain 35 or more pupils, while there should not be more than 25.

Dr. R. G. Lea, chairman of the School Board, presided at yesterday's meeting, at which Mr. Earle Nicholson was appointed physical training instructor for the four city schools, with Mr. Robert Mills as his assistant. Miss Mary Morrison was appointed teacher of the extra class at Prince Street.

King's County Stipendiary Magistrate Joseph W.
