Massey-Harris, Ferguson Co. Strike Continues

TORONTO, (CP)—A gathering of striking employees of the Massey-Harris-Ferguson Company Wednesday rejected proposals for settlement of the strike started more than four weeks ago by 2,800 workers.

A spokesman for the United Automobile Workers (UAW) said the vote against accepting the compromise proposal worked out with the help of Louis Fine, Ontario's chief conciliation officer, was "overwhelming."

The company announced earlier it agreed to the proposals. The suggested terms were not made public.

The workers struck to enforce demands for a 10-cent hourly wage increase. Starting rate at the big west-end plant is \$1.39 and the company says the average pre-strike rate was \$1.77.

Says Use of Oil Helps Coal Markets

SYDNEY (CP)—The vice-president of the Dominion Steel and Coal Corp. said Tuesday the use of more efficient oil fuel in certain stages of steel production is the only way to guarantee markets for coal in others.

C. M. Anson, who also is manager of steel operations for the corporation, told a service club luncheon that oil's efficiency had saved the Cape Breton steel industry by enabling it to compete more favorably with steel industries elsewhere. This, in turn, he said, has meant a guaranteed purchase of 1,000,000 tons of coal a year.

Dosco uses coal to make coke which is the fuel employed in blast furnaces where iron ore is reduced to a molten state preparatory to being converted into steel. The oil comes in as a fuel on the open hearth furnaces where the iron is turned into steel.

Thus, the Dosco vice-president said, the use of oil has meant greater efficiency and built an expanding market for the product of Cape Breton's ailing coal industry.
