

"Know Your Red Cross" Meeting Held At Tignish

Mr. Edwin Johnstone, President of the P. E. I. Red Cross, outlined to an interested audience in Tignish on Nov. 4 the many types of work carried on in this Province by the Red Cross.

He also touched on the wider scope of the Society as displayed by the re-union of 79 Greek children with their parents in Canada this year. This repatriation was possible only through the efforts of the Red Cross. It was the result of strenuous and wise effort by Dr. Stanbury, Commissioner of the Canadian Red Cross Society.

Accident prevention was the main topic at the Tignish meeting. Rev. M. D. Dunbar, chairman of the swimming and water safety services discussed ways of preventing accidents among fishermen. He displayed life jackets and life buoys and urged all to provide such equipment for their fishing boats.

Four young ladies received Royal Life Saving Society bronze medals. Mr. Dunbar congratulated each recipient as he presented the awards. He asked them to continue in this work and become swimming and water safety instructors.

Dr. A. J. Murchison, Chairman of the first aid services, quoted startling statistics on accidents in Canada and in this Province. He told something of the fine work being carried on by the Red Cross first aid posts in P. E. I. Three of the 40 Provincial first aid posts are all staffed by volunteer first aid workers who assume the responsibility of treating the injured any time of the day or night.

Dr. Murchison urged the men of Tignish to organize themselves into a first aid class. The Red Cross provides free instruction for any such group. Tignish has several experienced well-trained first aid instructors who would conduct a course of training.

Mr. J. Gordon MacDonald, chairman of disaster services told the audience that this year the disaster service volunteers were enlarging their scope to include some work on the prevention of fires. The past experience has shown that fires, particularly in rural areas, are very real disasters for the family involved. He suggested that every householder take steps to provide a stirrup pump and buckets of sand.

Mr. MacDonald explained the organization of the disaster services which have been established in larger centres in the Province. Residents of the Tignish area, who have destructive fires or other disastrous experiences should notify immediately the Red Cross first aid instructors or first aid post attendants. In this way they will receive necessary aid from the disaster services should trained volunteer helpers be needed in a large, scale disaster they could be prepared through Mr. Winston Currie, chairman of the Alberton unit.

Mr. MacDonald introduced five first aid volunteers from Alberton. This group headed by Mr. Herbert Leavitt demonstrated the handling of back injuries and the Holger-Neilsen method of Artificial respiration.

Let's Talk It Over

In industry there is probably a very small wastage of man-hours, and efficiency is on a high level. Unfortunately this does not hold true in the schools of our land where there is considerable wastage of boys and girl-hours. Not on the part of a great percentage of the boys and girls who attend our schools, of course, but there is a small minority who do virtually nothing useful in school. As far as they and their teachers are concerned, they would be much better off at some useful employment outside the school walls.

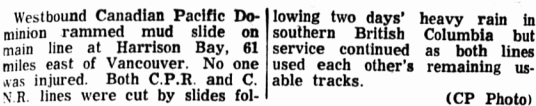
School teachers and school boards are notoriously lenient to this type of pupil. This probably stems from a desire not to offend the parents who fondly believe that as long as Johnny is in school, some of the benefits of that institution will somehow or other rub off on him. We're afraid this is not very often the case. The lazy boy in school gets more ill than good from his school attendance, developing as he does slothful habits that stick with him when he goes to work. Worse still, such a boy, or girl,

is often a mischief maker, and helps to lower the general discipline of his class, thus not only deriving no benefit himself, but robbing others of benefits they might derive.

The Edmonton School Board has made some very wise provisions regarding this problem. It works in three types as follows: (1) When the student is referred to the principal for habitual neglect of studies, the Principal will interview him. (2) Following this, after sufficient time has elapsed, his case will be placed on probation, and improvement is noted, the student will be placed on probation, and the superintendent will inform the parents. (3) If there is still no improvement in attitude, the Principal will refer the case to the superintendent, who, if deemed advisable, will ask the parents to withdraw the pupil from the school. Under the plan was this very apt and truthful statement: "In these days of overcrowded classrooms and rising high school attendance it seems only common sense that the lazy student should not be allowed to clutter up the classroom. He may, indeed, be better employed getting his education out in the workaday world where small patience is wasted on the lazy or just uninterested." Amen, say we.

clear purpose of bringing together the widely scattered areas of British North America within the boundaries of one nation. From the beginning of those discussions it was always apparent that if there were to be a single nation stretching from the Atlantic to the Pacific, trade must move east and west and that this would impose upon the national government the obligation to provide economic transportation east and west and to combine the strength of the partnership for the development of the whole area.

"That thought was in the minds of those who met here in Charlottetown ninety-one years ago. That thought was in the minds of those who framed our Constitution. That thought must always be in the minds of those who accept the responsibility for governing Canada. "If Sir John could speak to us today, I am sure he would remind us that the broad development of every part of Canada, with transportation to carry trade east and west at fair competitive prices, was an essential consideration in the discussions which made Confederation a reality.

PARTY COMMITMENT

"Our Party was committed to that principle when it started to work for a united Canada, it was committed to that principle when the first Government of Canada was formed in 1867, and it is committed to that principle today. "I want to speak of the broad policies of our Party in regard to national development because the discussion of the detailed problems of Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia or Newfoundland form a part of the broad program of our Party.
