

Whitby Dunlops Capture Hockey Title For Canada

Canadians Defeat Russia 4-2 In Thrilling Game

OSLO, Norway (CP)—Canada reconquered the world hockey summit Sunday by hammering Russia 4-2, coming from behind in a game filled with grit and speed. A thrill-packed climax brought two Canadian goals inside 30 seconds.

The Canadian Whitby team finished the eight-country, round-robin world hockey championship with a perfect record of seven straight wins.

But it had to forgo from the rear in a heart-stopping onslaught after the Russians grabbed a 1-0 lead in the first period of this, the final game. It was the first time Whitby had been behind in the 10-day tournament.

The teams were tied 2-2 with only 3½ minutes left to play and the atmosphere at the outdoor Jordal Amfi Stadium I where King Olaf V of Norway was among the spectators—was really tense.

DEFENCE COLLAPSES

Then the Canadians surged into the decisive attack and rammed in two goals as the over-worked Russian defence collapsed.

So the thriller ended the way it started—dramatically. Russia had rocked the Canadians with a goal in the third minute.

At the end the Canadian players released nine months of pent-up emotion. That's the time they had spent preparing for just this match—the over-riding aim being to defeat the powerful Russians.

They slapped each other on the back. They chattered young goalkeeper Roy Edwards around the rink. They went wild generally with excitement.

Canada finished with 14 points while Russia, unbeaten until Sunday but tied once by Czechoslovakia, had 11 points and second place. Defending titlist Sweden, winner last year when Canada wasn't represented in the championships, finished in third place, just one point behind the Soviets.

TWO BIG GOALS

It was Oshawa-born Bob Attersley, 24, who tied the score in the second period, then scored again in the third period with what was to be the winning goal.

Montreal's Connie Broden, 25-year-old centre who emerged from the tournament as leader in individual points, tallied unassisted at the midway mark of the third period, giving Canada a brief lead.

Jean Paul Lamirande assisted in Attersley's second goal and then Bus Gagnon, the Whitby team's playing-coach when it won the Allan Cup last year, fired an insurance marker, Attersley assisting.

By way of consolation prize, Russia won the European championship—decided during the tournament solely on the basis of games among European teams.

OTHER RESULTS

In other games Sunday, Norway defeated Poland 8-3 for its

first win, the United States trimmed little Finland 4-2 and Sweden beat Czechoslovakia 7-1.

The fighting Czechs, who tied Russia 4-4 and the U.S. 2-2 earlier, finished in fourth place on the basis of three wins and the two ties for eight points, they lost two games.

In injury-harassed U.S. team, with three wins, three losses and one win and one tie for three points, Norway seventh with two one ties, was fifth with seven points. Finland was sixth with points from one win and six losses, and Poland was last with no wins, one tie and six losses for one point.

It was the first title for Canada since 1955 and the 17th in world and Olympic competition dating back to the first winter Olympics in 1920 when Winnipeg Falcons were the winners.

SPLIT WITH RUSSIA

In four hockey summit meetings with the Russians, Canada now has won twice and the Russians twice.

In 1954, Russia was successful in its first bid for a world title. The Moscow Dynamos defeated Toronto East York in the final game of a Stockholm tournament.

Pestnikov Vs defeated Russia in the final game of the world competition at Krefeld, Germany, in 1955. Russia was second in the tournament.

In 1956, Russia defeated Canada's Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen in the final game of the Olympics at Cortina, Italy. Canada finished third, after Russia and the U.S.

Canada and the U.S. remained out of the world competition in 1957—when it was held in Moscow—because of the Hungarian tragedy.

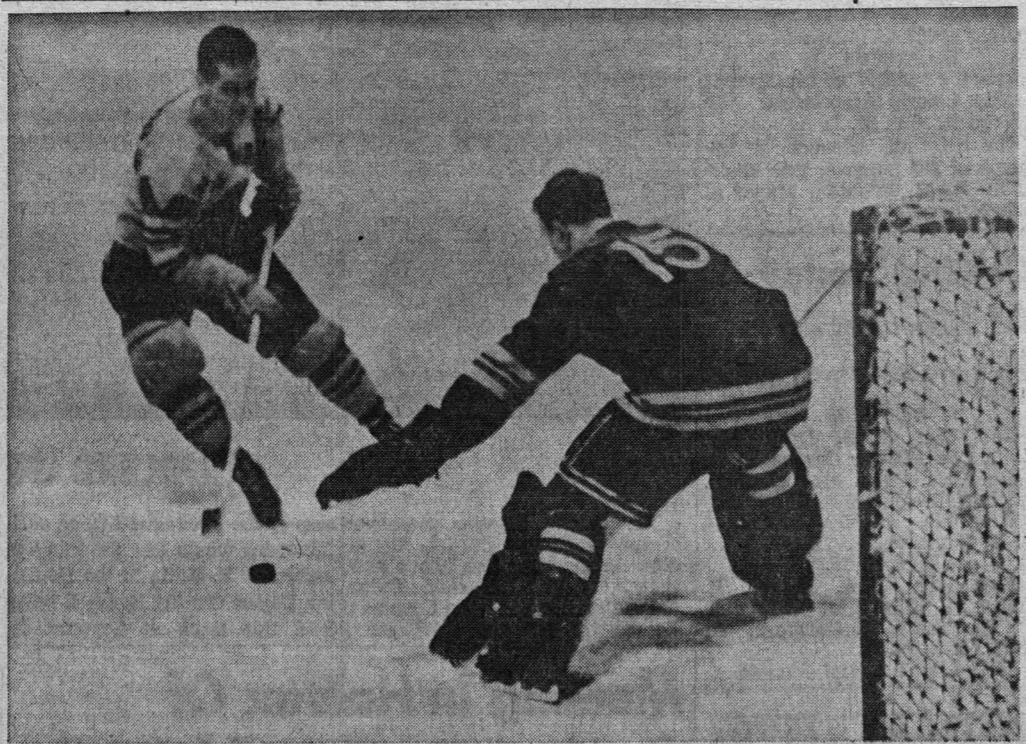
