## OPERATE ON ACTRESS

NEW YORK (AP)—Actress Shelley Winters underwent "emergency" minor surgery at Mt. Sinai Hospital Sunday, a hospital spokesman said Monday. The spokeswoman said Miss Winters "was in considerable pain when she arrived at the hospital" but that "she's doing fine now." The hospital did not disclose the nature of her ailment.

## Jets Clash Over Gaza Strip

GAZA, Egyptian-held Palestine (Reuters)—Israeli and Egyptian jet fighter planes met in a hostile encounter Monday for the first time on the frontier as ground forces in the embattled Gaza strip clashed for the sixth straight day.

Mendez resigned the post last week, the seventh since he left Peron's cabinet since the unsuccessful June 16 revolt against the government by naval personnel.

## Decision Meets Portion Of Rhee's Demands

PANMUNJOM, Korea, (Reuters)—The Korean mixed armistice commission agreed Monday to reduce the size and number of the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission teams in North and South Korea.

The decision, which goes part way to meet a demand of the South Korean government for expulsion of Communist Polish and Czech members of the team, followed sharp criticism of the Communist members by Maj.-Gen. Harlan S. Parks, American chief of the United Nations delegation to the mixed armistice commission.
