or in other words, letting loose bands of savages on defenceless frontier settlements. They committed one dreadful massacre at Frog Lake, and under his leadership, engaged in three or four fights with the troops. The general result was that on the Government side 67 men were killed and 119 wounded. The killed were mostly young business men who were serving in the militia. If a man ought ever to be hanged for taking other men's lives and making their homes desolate, Riel certainly deserved his fate.

The Scottish American Journal says: "A man does not need to have a very good memory to recall the fact that the New York Herald did its best to precipitate the Southern rebellion, and bring on the civil war. Perhaps it had a right to do this; but when it aims to organize rebellions in Canada, a country quite as well governed as any nation in the world, it is guilty of an impertinence, the malevolence of which is only in part excused by its extreme silliness."

The Regina Leader says:—"No language could be too strong to paint the enormity of Riel's offence against society. But the Government had not only to consider his sentence in a punitive light, they had to pay regard to the populations amongst which he had not only followers but dupes; they had to take some thought for the future. We know that misery has been introduced into the homes of hundreds of half-breeds. We know that our population is still heterogeneous. The comparison made between the rebellion of the South and the American republic is, like most such comparisons, a fallacy. There is no analogy. We have a sacred duty to the Indian. We owe wise and suitable government to the half-breeds. The truest mercy to both is to show them unmistakably, and if necessary, sternly, that no man can attempt to destroy the authority of the Government of this country in any part of it, unless at the peril of his life."
