AFTER AMEREAU.—An officer from Watertown, Mass., went over from St. John by steamer to Digby, on the 18th, to bring AmerEAU away under the Extradition Act. It is currently reported in Digby that AmerEAU broke down on Monday evening, and confessed to being the murderer of Mrs. Carlton. It is said he was in tears the most of the evening, and sent for his priest.

SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.—On Monday morning, between five and six o'clock, the body of John Brennan, belonging to Pictou, who has lately been keeping a junk shop on Irving's wharf, was discovered in the water. An inquest was held. After deliberation the jury returned the following verdict:—"That the said John Brennan came to his death at Pictou, from suffocation and drowning in the waters of the harbor of Pictou, while laboring under an aberration of mind produced by excessive indulgence in alcoholic liquors."

The Plaindealer of the 18th instant, published at New Glasgow, N. S., announces that Mr. John Ross, formerly of Ross' Weekly, Charlottetown, is now on its staff, "in the capacity of manager." For many years Mr. Ross has been connected with the Press of this Province. Ross' Weekly had, at one time, a large circulation, especially among the tenantry, whose cause against landlordism it espoused. The great fire of 1866 destroyed Mr. Ross' printing office. The politicians whose cause he advocated, as is too often the case, deserted him in his difficulties. We wish Mr. Ross success in his new position.

We are pleased to learn that Mr. T. S. Cole, the travelling secretary for the Young Men's Christian Associations of Canada will give a Bible reading, on Christian work, to-morrow (Sunday) evening, in the Baptist Meeting House. Meeting commences at 6.30 o'clock. It is said by those who attended some of these Bible readings, at the Y. M. C. A. Hall, during the week, that they could have listened for hours, that they were so very interesting and profitable. No doubt all who can well avail themselves of the opportunity of hearing this, which is, probably, the last Mr. Cole will give here for the present, as he intends leaving for the other Provinces on Monday.

CRICKET.—The Wanderers Team of Halifax arrived here last evening and are staying at the Rankin House. Owing to the wet weather they did not play at Moncton as was originally intended, but came on to Charlottetown. The team is composed of H. M. McDonald, W. H. Brookfield, X. Oxley, W. Neal, jr., E. G. Kenny, F. A. Kaizer, T. J. Cochran, R. H. Humphrey, L. J. Fuller, W. A. Henry, jr. Two complete matches will be played at the Park—on Monday and Tuesday. Much interest is being manifested in these matches by the public, and they will be well contested. The Phoenix have been playing very regularly during the past week, though they labor under the disadvantage of having so few members that it has been impossible to play any matches among themselves. Our sympathy of course is with our own men, and we can do no more than wish them success.

YESTERDAY news reached us of the strike of the Telegraph operators in connection with the Western Union Telegraph Company. The demands which they made cannot be called extravagant or out of the question. They desire the abolition of Sunday work which seems to be very reasonable indeed. They complain that their hours are too long, and that eight hours constitute a days work, and seven hours a nights work. They want men and women to be on an equality, and last, but most important, they demand an increase of 15 per cent. on wages. To give an idea of the strength of the Telegraph Brotherhood, the following list will be of interest: Toronto, 280 members; Montreal, 130; Halifax, N. S., 40; St. John, N. B., 35; Pittsburg, Pa., 480; New Haven, Conn., 35; Hartford, 30; Philadelphia, Pa., 520; Chicago, Ill., 530; St. Louis, Mo., 250; Cincinnati, O., 175; Baltimore, Md., 230; Richmond, Va., 75; Brooklyn, N. Y., 210; Oil City, Pa., 175; Buffalo, N. Y., 200; Boston, Mass., 250; Cleveland, O., 265; Toledo, O., 70; Washington, D. C., 95; Omaha, Neb., 40; New Orleans, La., 60; Atlanta, Ga., 190; Chattanooga, Tenn., 100; Rochester, N. Y., 50. All other cities are strong in proportion, and include hundreds of railroad operators at small towns and stations.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Telegraphers Strike in Canada.

ST. JOHN, N. B., July 20. The telegraphers' strike still continues in the St. John office, but a number of operators have been secured.

Mr. Robinson said, at midnight, that the greater part of the business has been cleared off, and work is going on smoothly. He thinks that to-morrow, 21st, will see things running smoothly throughout the Lower Province.

The memorial of the Canadian employees is identical with that of the American employees.

At Toronto a considerable accession to the staff has taken place, and work is going on fairly well.

Last night some dozen strikers attempted to force their way to the operators' room, but were repulsed.

The Strike in the States.

NEW YORK, July 20. Reports from St. Joseph, Leavenworth, Topeka, Atchison, Lawrence and other places, state that all offices are in fair shape.

The reports from the striking operators show the situation unchanged. The Western Union officials do not regard the situation alarming, and think that they will, or the greater part of them, will return to work in a few days. The cable wires suffered no stoppage or interruption.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.

Sixteen operators have struck, but their places were filled. Reports from the West say the ranks of the Brotherhood remain solid.

CINCINNATI, July 20.

The striking operators have an arrangement to receive telegraphic news from New York, and hold secret sessions daily.

PHILADELPHIA, July 20.

The Mutual Union office was opened for business to-day, with only one operator and a messenger boy in charge.

WORCESTER, July 20.

The Western Union Office here is running, with the manager and one lady.

DETROIT, July 20.

The situation is unchanged, business is done under extraordinary difficulties. The strikers are well behaved.

CHICAGO, July 20.

Col. Clowry, this evening, said they were already in a position to handle more business than the public handed in.

Manager McCullagh of the Baltimore and Ohio Company believes the operators will win and bring the Company to terms.

HARTFORD, CONN., July 20.

Line men both here and in the vicinity have joined the strikers.

PITTSBURG, July 20.

The Western Union has thirty-two operators at work here, business moves along smoothly.

NEW YORK, July 20. A reward of \$500 is offered for the arrest of any person unlawfully injuring any of the Company's Lines, &c.

Cholera in the East.

ALEXANDRIA, July 20.

Twenty-nine deaths yesterday from cholera, and twenty-four at Samaanoud, twenty-eight at Ghizeh, forty-four at Chirbin, and three at Damietta. There were sixteen deaths at Menzaleh Tuesday.

CAIRO, July 20.

There were 140 deaths from cholera here yesterday.
