Girl Shot Down Leaving Work

TORONTO (CP) — Police said John David Hill, 25-year-old welder, shot and killed Marian Spencer, 19, a stenographer, in a downtown office building late Friday, then turned the revolver on himself and died a few hours later. Miss Spencer, who works for United States Steel Export Company, had three bullet wounds in her chest. Hill was shot twice in the head. There were more bullet marks at the end of the 19th-storey corridor where the shooting took place. Police said Miss Spencer had left work with a friend, Margaret Mackie. Miss Mackie said they passed a man carrying a brown paper bag near the elevators of the 20-storey Royal Bank Building at King and Yonge streets. She said he stepped back to face Miss Spencer and muttered something.

Charles de Gaulle's bid for power, Friday night postponed a crucial decision on whether to back the wartime leader. Whether the general would be prepared to go before the National Assembly and ask investiture as premier with full powers for at least a year depended on that decision.

Call Off Search For Missing Boy

Some Aspects Of U.S. Pensions May Work Here

OTTAWA (CP)—Prof. Robert M. Clark said Friday he believes it is possible to adapt certain features of the high-paying United States contributory pensions scheme to the Canadian economy.

ALL CONTRIBUTE

Under the American system, contributions are made by employees, employers and the self-employed. Pension payments start at the age of 65 for men and 62 for women and even earlier if ill-health forces a person's retirement. Canada's universal pension starts at the age of 70. Payments to retired American workers can go as high as \$106.50 a month. The average payment is 76 a month for a single person, \$128 for married couples without dependents and \$65 for aged widows.
