WHIPPANY, N. J. (AP)—Vending machine sales hit an estimated \$2,000,000 in 1956. By 1960 experts estimated \$5,000,000, 100 million coins will clink down the steel gutlets of millions of coin machines.

In the works are machines that will cook and serve a full course meal in 10 seconds. Vending machines already can support a person from cradle to grave—providing his change holds out.

There are vending machines that give rubdowns, shoeshines, electric shavers, food and drink of all kinds, newspapers, music, insurance policies, laundry service, books, hosiery, perfume, records, railroad pictures and highway tolls. A combination job takes the toll and a picture of your licence plate, just in case you try to slip through without paying.

Are you pale? A vending machine sells artificial sunlight. Think you have diabetes? Another machine dispenses a simple test to detect the disease.

Eisenhower Praises U.K. Defence Streamlining Plan

WASHINGTON (AP)—Britain's decision to reduce and streamline her far-flying armed forces was applauded by President Eisenhower Wednesday as an example of "courage and nerve."

He made clear he is not alarmed at the drastic defence cutbacks even though he acknowledged they have "disturbed some of our NATO partners."

Eisenhower told a press conference British leaders in effect had no alternative but to slash defence spending in view of Britain's post-war economic problems. British manpower is to be cut by almost 50 per cent, down to 375,000 men, within the next five years under the plan which includes reduction of troops in Korea, Libya and West Germany. The remaining forces will be geared to atomic-hydrogen warfare with piloted aircraft eventually replaced by guided missiles. NOT GOING TO FAR

Carrier's Crew Saves Seaman

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian crew of the aircraft carrier Magnificent Saturday saved the life of a German merchant seaman when the ship's doctor performed an emergency appendectomy in mid-Atlantic, navy headquarters said Sunday.

The Magnificent, en route to Davenport, England, for return to the Royal Navy after nine years on loan to Canada, received a call for assistance from the Luebeck Line steamship SS. Poschell, bound for Baltimore, Md.

The Canadian carrier reached the German merchant ship at a position 1,100 miles out of Halifax, and its crew transferred the ailing seaman to the carrier's sick bay, where a successful operation was performed by Surgeon Cmdr. R. B. Irwin of South River, Ont.

The seaman, not identified in the navy's report, is convalescing in the Magnificent, scheduled to reach the U.K. April 18. The carrier sailed April 10 from Halifax, where it returned last February after transferring troops, vehicles and supplies to Egypt for the UN Emergency Force.
