Arabi on Trial.

He will be Defended.

HOMEWARD BOUND.

ALEXANDRIA, Oct. 15.

The Egyptian Government are preparing a note for the British Consul here, stating that the Government prefers to hand over Arabi to the military authorities rather than admit foreign counsel at the trial.

Mark Francis Napier will defend Arabi before the Court Martial to-morrow. Yesterday's preliminary investigation terminated in a very unfavorable way. There is no doubt that the rebel will receive but little mercy and scant justice.

Wolsey has received his orders for home. He is expected to leave here next Thursday.

Obeidullah on the Move.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 15.

The Khurdish Sheikh Obeidullah is threatening Ban with an army of ten thousand men. Thirty thousand Persians are marching against him, and hopes are entertained that the leader will soon be subdued. The Ottoman troops have been ordered to take Obeidullah, dead or alive.

De Lesseps on the Canal.

Death of Count Napoleon.

PARIS, Oct. 15.

De Lesseps says there is no foundation for the exaggerated rumors afloat concerning the Suez Canal and England's movements. He alleges that the best understanding exists between the English members and the Suez Canal Company.

National Independence for Ireland!

LONDON, Oct. 15.

A man named Brookshaw, a commercial traveller, has been committed for trial for sending a threatening letter to Colonel Teesdale, Esquerry to the Prince of Wales, in which the prisoner said that he would murder the Prince unless the sum of money demanded was sent. The defence is that the prisoner is a crank. He is reported to have served in the American Army during the last war.

News has been received here that a plot has been discovered to burn the Imperial Theatre at Riga.

At the Miners' Conference, it was decided that the Lancashire, Yorkshire, Derbyshire, and North Wales Miners simultaneously demand an advance of fifteen per cent.

The British steamer "Preston," plying between New York and Newcastle is ashore at Berwick.

At the Irish National Convention at Dublin, yesterday, resolutions were adopted declaring the right of the country to National Independence.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

CAIRO, Oct. 13.

The examination of Arabi was continued yesterday. It is understood that he ably defended himself, denying complicity in the massacres and in the burning of Alexandria. He boldly vindicated his conduct as leader of the national party. He said that when he reached Cairo after his defeat at Tel-el-Kebir and found the inhabitants unwilling to continue the struggle he immediately bowed to their will and surrendered.

Gen. Wolsey has not yet received permission to leave Egypt.

LONDON, Oct. 13.

The Times prints a letter from Wilford Blunt to Gladstone protesting against the action of the Egyptian authorities in preventing counsel from seeing Arabi to prepare his defence. Blunt observes that the trial will be over before a conclusion is arrived at satisfactory to anyone but those who have designed the prisoner's death.

The race for the juvenile handicap at Newmarket to-day, was won by Castlereagh's "Petticoat," with Ellesmere's "Lizzie" second and Zetland's "Eva" third. Ten ran, including Lorillard's "Touch Me-not."

TUNIS, Oct. 13.

Mr. Broadley, an English barrister, has left here for Egypt, to defend Arabi.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 14.

The Australians won the cricket match to-day by a score of 159 to 158.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.

The Lighthouse Board, to-day, decided to discontinue west light at Cape Elizabeth, Maine, and remove the revolving machinery in that tower to East lighthouse.

This evening, George D. Rice, cashier of the Lebanon Dime Savings Bank, was robbed of a satchel containing \$30,000 in bills. He had just returned from Philadelphia, and before going to the bank stopped at his home for supper, and while on his way to the bank after supper he was passed by two men and directly afterwards received a stunning blow, knocking him into the gutter. The men then wrested the satchel from him and fled. No clue.
