Stresses Fishery
Problems In House



A suggestion that some of the
patrol boats watching for poach-
ers might be used in locating new
lobster fishing grounds was ad-
vanced in the Legislature yester-
day by Mr. Hubert Gaudet,
(above) as the member from First
Prinice made his maiden speech.

Mr. Gaudet admitted that there
had been poaching in his County
but said that the fishermen were
not altogether to blame as they
had to make a living and there
was too small a territory for the
number of boats fishing. He
briefly referred to "bundle" fish-
ing as the setting out in one place
of 12 to 15 traps.

The speaker referred to a special
method of marking lobsters on
the flesh so that they might be
traced despite the shedding of the
shell. He told the members that
after a "rough" winter the fishing
was never good so many of the
lobsters were tossed on the
beach. He also reminded his lis-
teners of the earlier days of fish-
ing when a Mr. James McMillan
once landed 128,000 pounds by
count and any lobster under nine
inches had an extra one added to
make up for the lightness of the
first.

Urges Better Understanding

He disagreed with the present
system of smashing the gear and
cutting the rope of all equipment,
taken from the poachers and said
that many of the fishermen were
forced to poach in order to buy
themselves a bite to eat. He
pleaded for better understanding
of the fishermen's plight by the
Government authorities because
"it is hard on those just trying
to earn a living."

Mr. Gaudet while favoring the
use of draggers also thought that
greater curing facilities were
needed in Prince County and said
that if they were available there
would be far less poaching. At
the same time he resented the
"time lag" between the destruc-
tion of inshore fishermen's gear
and the date of payment by drag-
ger owners.

In a short reference to the
roads of the Province he expressed
the opinion that Hon. Dougald
MacKinnon, Minister of High-
ways, thought the Island ended at
Elmsdale and he thought his dis-
trict was deserving of a paved
road. He did not particularly care
where it went, he would leave
that to the judgment of the Gov-
ernment, but he wanted one for
his constituents.

He was particularly critical of
the lack of proper plowing of the
roads this winter. But Mr. Mac-
Kinnon said that Mr. Gaudet's
district was probably better taken
care of than the Minister's own
district of Fourth Queens.
