## Cease Fire Threatened By Attack

**RABAT, Morocco (AP)—**The Moroccan army said Sunday its troops had pushed back an Algerian infantry attack after all-day fighting in and around oasis of Figui.

The Moroccan said Figui was attacked by several thousand Algerians Sunday morning after a heavy artillery barrage. The attack again damaged the precarious cease-fire signed by the two sides at Bamako, Mali, last week. Figui has been the scene of fighting since the cease-fire deadline of midnight Friday night.

The only telephone line linking Figui was the rest of the country was cut, but Moroccan troops were still holding the highway between the oasis and Bou Arfa.

During the day, troops of the Algerian "Nation People's Army" slowly progressed into the oasis, the Moroccan said. The Algerians were reported abandoning the oasis when they had secured earlier, the Moroccan said.

Both sides blamed the other for the fighting.

## U.S. Regret Is Expressed At South Viet Nam Deaths

**WASHINGTON (AP)—**High United States officials expressed regret Sunday night that South Viet Nam President Ngo Dinh Diem and his brother Ngo Dinh Nhu had met

U.S. sources said the United States will not and cannot be expected to accept any responsibility for the violent events that overtook the two ruling brothers in the wake of the successful military coup.

## Blast Deaths Climb To 38

**INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—**The death count in the Halloween explosion which ripped the State Fairgrounds Coliseum reached 38 Sunday and teetered on the brink of becoming Indiana's worst disaster in history.

The toll already matched the state's worst previous catastrophe, a train wreck 45 years ago.

While gas experts planned to begin shifting the coliseum rubble today, a 15-carload demolition worker told of a "blue haze" seeping from an overturned cylinder beneath the stand only seconds before the Thursday night explosion.

Eight bodies were recovered as police continued to drag the 46-foot deep river for the remaining three and were in the car at the time of the crash.

One relative of the victims said they were "all one big family."

## Motorists Trapped In Que. Snowfall

## 10 Dead From Miners Sealed in Flooded Shaft

**BROISTEADT, West Germany (AP)—**Surface workers made contact Sunday in the flooded Lengede iron mine with 11 men who had been given up for dead—with 29 others a week ago. Drillers hoped to rescue them by Wednesday.

A narrow supply shaft was quickly sunk 200 feet to the trapped band in the third crucial rescue operation since a broken dam poured millions of gallons of water from an ore-washing reservoir into the mine at 4 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 24.

The trapped men had been pulled out previously after extensive drilling, though a drop in the water level permitted seven of these to raft to safety rather than using an escape shaft specially sunk for them.

A stream of supplies—leaves, soup, chocolate and zwieback, plus lanterns, underwear and socks—moved down the supply shaft to the narrow mine chamber where stagnant water sealed the 11 with 10 of the dead men.

The gallery is only about 13 feet long and 10 feet wide. It is 23 feet high, with a ceiling of relatively loose earth and rock.

"I am completely overwhelmed," said Rudolf Sletta, a spokesman for the iron mining company, on learning the 11 had lived there for 10 days without food, heat or light. "Nobody thought it was possible."

The rescue service in Hannover called it a miracle.

Dr. Kellner said the first thing a spokesman for the men called out was "I know we wouldn't be abandoned—that something would be done to get us out."

Others died after exhaustion.
