the club must have calves as a project. Actually the members will show far more interest in club work if they are given the responsibility of looking after and feeding a calf. Therefore, it is strongly recommended that all club members who join a club make a special effort to obtain a calf as their own project.

Communities wishing to organize a club should contact Mr. C. Keith Clay, Supervisor of 4-H Clubs, Provincial Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown, before April 30 and preferably during the month of January.

MEETINGS

There may be more than one breed of calves in a club, either grade or purebred, and the calves must be born after January 1st and taken over by the club member not later than April 30. Where there is more than one breed of calves in a club, there must be a minimum of five calves per breed in order to be eligible to exhibit the calves at local achievement day, which is held early in the fall.

An adult club leader must be appointed by each club to look after and guide the club members in their work. Two directors should be appointed to assist the club leader when and where required.

Officers must also be appointed from the club members themselves. These are: President, Vice-President and Secretary-Treasurer.

MEETINGS

Each club is required to hold one regular meeting a month to carry on 4-H business. In addition to the foregoing, four judging classes are held during the summer months of May, June, July and August. These classes teach the club members how to judge and evaluate cattle.

A record of the feed given the calf must be kept and a copy of this record forwarded to the Provincial Department of Agriculture at the end of each month.

LOCAL ACHIEVEMENT DAY

Local achievement days are miniature fairs held by each club during the latter part of August and the first part of September. These fairs may be held at some local farm in the community or at one of the near by exhibitions. Here the club members bring their calves where they are judged on conformation and type and the three top calves in each breed are then taken to the Rural Youth Fair in Charlottetown for Provincial Honors.

Club members have various projects to carry out which are referred to as "Year's Work." This value of broken down and indicated: Attendance (10-10); Interest Show (10-10); Feed Reports (20-20); Showing of Calves at Local Achievement Day (40-40); Care of Calf (20-20).

PRIZE MONEY

The prize money which each club member receives is based on their standing in their year's work. They are scored on the various items listed under year's work.

Each 4-H club is required to participate in public speaking and debating to train club members in how to express themselves well in public. Each year there is a Provincial contest held in both public speaking and debating for Provincial honors. The top two winners in public speaking then go to Amherst at the time of the Maritime Winter Fair where they compete against other 4-H members from both Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

Rural boys and girls who become members of 4-H clubs receive training in public speaking; the feeding and management of calves; learn how to conduct public meetings; how to plan their own local community entertainments and in general this training helps them to become better citizens.

Quiet Christmas Eve Observance At Vatican

VATICAN CITY (AP) - Christmas Eve in this centre of Roman Catholicism is observed almost in a family manner - a quiet waiting for the feast day of the birth of Christ.

There is no great midnight mass in St. Peter's Basilica.

But at the stroke of midnight, Pope Pius XII will again lift his hands in the privacy of his little chapel to celebrate the mass. Only a few close associates of his Vatican household will attend.

At the same time, the small company of Swiss Guards will file quietly from their barracks to their own chapel of St. Martin in the Vatican to attend midnight mass. It will be celebrated by their Swiss chaplain, Msgr. Paul Krieger.

HOLD SERVICES

The big Christmas masses are held at the Vatican on Christmas Day, a series at the many altars of St. Peter's Basilica. But many Romans, tourists and pilgrims will have attended midnight services in various churches of Rome especially at the ancient Ara Coeli - Altar of Heaven - Church that rises high near the city hall.

For thousands of pilgrims and tourists already gathered in Rome a highlight of the Christmas celebration will come at noon Christmas Day. Then, as he usually does, Pope Pius is to appear at his apartment window to give his blessing to the thousands gathered in the square.

For the pontiff himself, an important part of the observance comes Sunday, when he delivers his annual Christmas message to the world. It will be the 18th in the long series dedicated primarily to peace.

The pontiff is also expected to refer once again - as he did a year ago - to colonialism and atomic explosions. He is almost certain to refer to the sad plight of Hungary, a situation that prompted him on Oct. 27 to call for worldwide prayers for that nation's people.

On Christmas Day, the Pope will spend some time with members of his family. This normally is the only day in the year that he meets thus with them in a brief respite from his arduous schedule.
