A Delegation Visits Charlottetown—Lodges to be Established.

The Grand Lodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen of Quebec and the Maritime Provinces last week concluded a most successful annual session at St. John. N. B. On Saturday evening a delegation from the Grand Lodge, numbering about twenty-five, came on to Charlottetown, the following Grand Officers being in the party: AT Patterson, Grand Recorder; O W G Dettmers, Chairman Finance; R Lynch, Executive Committee; Dr Triggane, Grand Medical Examiner; P M W Savoie. Several ladies accompanied the party.
A representative of THE EXAMINER, who met several of the Grand Officers at the Hotel Davies was assured that the Ancient Order of United Workmen was the strongest beneficiary organization on the continent, having a membership of over 375,000 and paying annually to the widows of its deceased members the large sum of \$7,500,000. He was further informed that it is the intention to establish subordinate lodges in this province. The insurance rates, it was pointed out, are very low and there are many advantages resulting from membership. The delegates were delighted with what they saw of Charlottetown, and look forward to being able to hold their annual meeting here in 1901. The meeting next year will be held in Halifax.
