NEW NURSES' RESIDENCE FOR MONTAGUE.—The construction of the new nurses' residence at Montague is rapidly proceeding, and already the framing and boarding-in have been completed, together with the roofing. The residence is 55 feet long by 34 feet wide, providing 12 bedrooms, sitting room, reception room, matron's room, bathrooms, and kitchen. It is a two-storey frame building. There are eight bedrooms on the second floor and all other rooms are located on the first floor. The new residence, under contract to County Construction, was started on August 18, and is scheduled to be completed in November.

The following statement was issued yesterday by Mr. Arthur E. Holland, Summerside, president of Local 1811, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, in connection with the current wage and hours dispute for telephone employees:

"The statement of fact sent out to their employees by the Island Telephone Co. and also handed over to the press for mass circulation throughout the Province, does not contribute to improve the present differences between the Company and the Union. Our attitude toward the Company approaching the Public Utility Board at this time is that they are 'putting the cart before the horse'."

"We maintain that they should have accepted the decision of the Arbitration Board, put it into practice, and then go to the Public Utility Board if they could show that it was hurting them."

Large Catches Reported By Dragger Fleet Off Souris

The dragger fleet operating out of Souris has had some very successful fishing trips during the present month. In one period of two weeks the boats landed 40,000 lbs. of codfish, more than 45,000 lbs. of hake, 176,000 lbs. of haddock and 192,000 lbs. of flounders, for a total of almost 800,000 pounds. This was the largest amount of fish landed, in any two week period, since dragger fishing was introduced in the Province several years ago, according to officials of the Department of Fisheries in Charlottetown. Mackerel are beginning to put in an appearance off Rustico, and fishermen are expecting the large autumn variety to show up very soon. Unfavorable weather has prevented wide-scale fishing out of Rustico for most of the past week. The boats brought in a few mackerel yesterday. Some salmon are usually caught at St. Peter's Bay by fishermen at this time of year, but thus far very few have been taken. The quantity is never very large in the best of seasons. The price of cod, hake, haddock and flounders is fair; the price for mackerel is good.
