

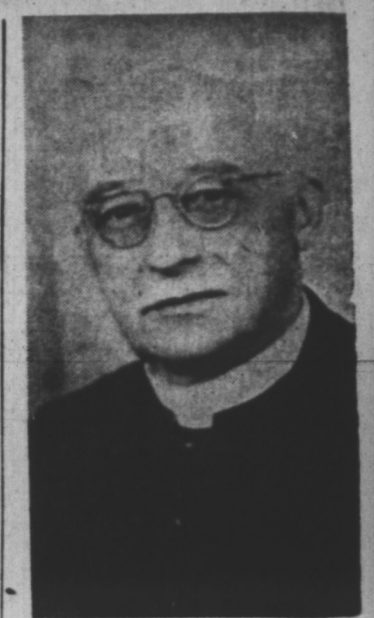
2 Island Ministers Received Doctorate Degrees At Halifax

Honorary degrees of doctor of divinity were conferred on two Island ministers at convocation exercises of Pine Hill Divinity College at Halifax last night.

Receiving the degrees were Rev. T. A. Wilson of Charlottetown and Rev. D.M. Sinclair, former pastor of the United Church at Valleyfield. Rev. Sinclair now resides in Halifax. An honorary doctorate degree was also conferred on Rev. H. E. Campbell of Halifax.

Mr. Wilson, now retired from Church work is a graduate of MacGill University and Pine Hill. He retired in 1953 after giving 40 years of service to two P.E.I. congregations. He spent 36 of those years at West Covehead. Mr. Sinclair is a P.E.I. native and an outstanding exponent of Gaelic literature. He was educated at Pictou Academy, Dalhousie Pine Hill and New Glasgow, Edinburgh.

After post graduate work in Scotland he served the United Church in Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia and during the Second World War he was a chaplain in the navy.

Education Director Attempts To Boost Teaching Interest

Malcolm MacKenzie, deputy minister and director of education, has begun a series of talks aimed at increasing enrollment in teachers training classes at Prince of Wales College and directed to P. E. I. high school students.

Mr. MacKenzie will give talks to students in every senior high school on the Island. He will explain the advantages of professional teaching and the assistance which the department of education is prepared to give to students taking the course.

His visits will include informal discussion with students on personal requirements. He will also answer any questions that may arise. A point being stressed by the

deputy minister is that it is better to take a full year course at PWC than to obtain licences through summer courses. There is \$500 difference in salary between a teacher holding only a permit and one holding a first class B licence.

In addition students studying at PWC get a \$200 grant and a \$300 loan. The loan may be paid back at the teachers' convenience. In order to be eligible for the loan the teacher must agree to teach for two years in this province.

Mr. MacKenzie said yesterday that in two schools visited so far great interest in teaching was evident among the students. At one school 19 of 41 signified a desire to make a career of teaching.
