Mr. Henry M. Stanley has been made a K. G. C. B., an honor that, comparing his work in exploration with that of other recipients in other fields of enterprise, he has fairly won. As his real name is John Rowlands, he will be the second knight the Queen has created under a name taken in late life, the first being John Broadbent, better known as Sir Henry Irving.—Montreal Gazette.

Mr. Aubin E. Arseneault has been commissioned by Charles Russell & Co., of London, on some important business to Koksstad East, Grijpaland, South Africa, and left Southampton on the 27th of last month by the Royal Mail Steamer Norham castle for Natal, which place he will reach about the 22nd of this month. On his return to England, about the end of July, he will leave for Charlottetown, accompanied by Mr. H. Mackenzie. On their arrival here they will open an office for the practice of their profession.

The South Wallian, for May, contains a portrait and sketch of Mr. Thomas Pictou Richards, who has lately been appointed to the important position (in Great Britain) of Justice of the Peace. Mr. Richards is a brother of the Hon. William Richards of this Province, and mention is made of his business connections here. The South Wallian says: "As is well-known his (Mr. Richards) trading transactions during the last forty years have been of very extensive character; and, if for no other reason, on that ground alone he thoroughly deserves the recent honor conferred upon him by the Lord Chancellor. As was stated in the South Wallian for August of last year, Mr. P. P. Richards, with his brother, the Hon. W. Richards, and the Hon. John Yeo, extensive owners and ship-builder in Prince Edward Island, Canada, have built and owned over 200 ships. The "Richards' fleet" is well-known by the rig of the vessel, most of which of whatever tonnage, are "fore and afters," the firm being the first to build and own a large four-masted vessel rigged after the fashion named. Mr. Richards has been for many years, and continues to be, largely interested in the business of sailing ships and steamers. It is well-known that Mr. T. P. Richards has sat for years as the first representative of Swansea and Newport on Lloyd's Committee. He is also a Director of the Empire Assurance Association. With such ripe experience as Mr. Richards possesses, he is well qualified to fill the position on the magisterial bench to which he has been recently appointed."
