MRS. E. PETER HARRINGTON

The many friends of Mrs. Theresa Harrington, widow of the late E. Peter Harrington, formerly of Kensington and Charlottetown, regretted to learn of her sudden passing after a lengthy illness, on May 7th, at the Victoria General Hospital, Halifax.

Mrs. Harrington was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Duffy of Maplewood, Prince Edward Island. After completing her primary education, she attended Prince of Wales College and upon graduation, devoted some years to the teaching profession in the various schools of the Province.

The late Mrs. Harrington was an exemplary wife and mother. Imbued with the ideals of a Christian home, she devoted her life to the education of her family. That her goal was in the full measure attained is attested by the fact that all members of her family attended Prince of Wales College as a preliminary to furthering their education in different universities to prepare them for their various careers. Some of her children followed her own career in the teaching profession not only in P. E. I., but in other provinces of Canada as well. In addition, Mrs. Harrington had the honor of sending one of the youngest students ever to attend Prince of Wales College, when her eldest son, Cyrus, passed matriculation before completing his twelfth birthday.

Though devoted to the interests of her family, the late Mrs. Harrington took a keen interest in community work. She was profoundly interested in all church affairs, and was for many years a most ardent worker and promoter in the various activities of the Women's Liberal Club. She was a Silver Cross mother, having lost her second son, Eugene, at the Battle of Vimy Ridge.

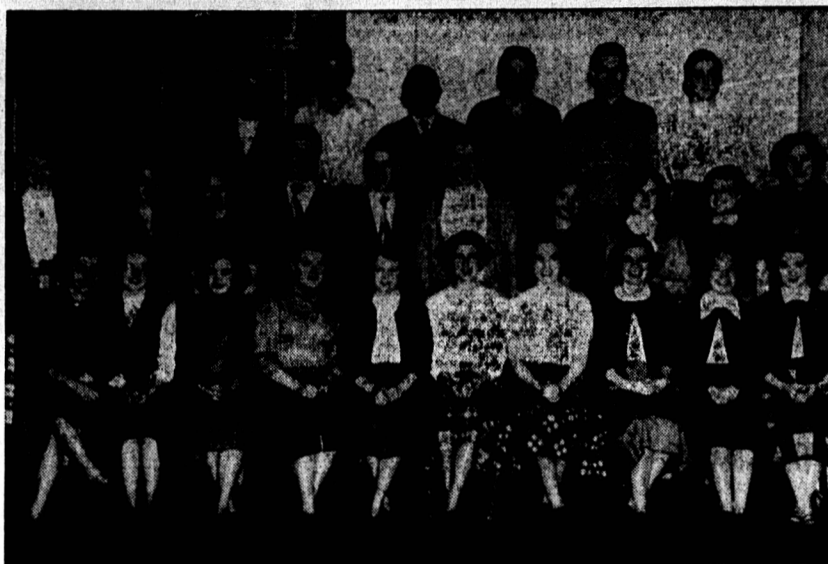
