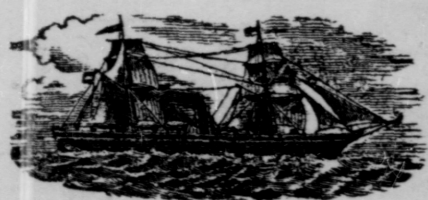

Obituary.

The death of Mrs. William Balls, which occurred at her home, North River, on Tuesday morning, Nov. 13th, is a peculiarly sad bereavement. Only 23 years of age, with the brightest prospects of life before her. She is suddenly called away from mortal scenes to leave a sorrowing husband, and one dear little child who is too young to realize that she has lost the very best of earthly friends. During her residence at North River she won the high esteem of the entire community. Her quiet but consistent christianity and uniformly attractive deportment has left a favorable impression which will not soon be forgotten. A recent cold rapidly developed into the most severe form of pneumonia, and all that a skillful physician and loving attendants could do did not stop the progress of the disease, the end coming rather unexpectedly. A few minutes before her departure, Mrs. Balls gave assurance to the writer that her future was perfectly secured in the love of Jesus. "To live is Christ but to die is gain." Mrs. Balls was the daughter of Mr. W. W. Rodd, of North River. Mr. Balls, in his great affliction, has the sympathy of the entire locality, and we also desire to express words of true consolation for all who in a special sense are sorrowing because the Lord has seen fit to transfer this fair flower of humanity to the gardens of Glory. The funeral took place yesterday and was largely attended. The funeral services were conducted by the Revs. J. W. McConnell and A. F. Browne.

Local and Other Items

—McLellan has demanded a recount.
—Read the beginning of our new story, "Ray's Recruit," in to-day's EXAMINER.
—John Ring, charged with drunkenness, was this morning fined \$2 or 10 days.
—The general conference of the Methodist Church will be invited to meet at Winnipeg in 1902, if satisfactory rates can be made with the railways.
—On and after Monday next the Princess will leave Charlottetown for Pictou at seven each morning instead of at nine, and will leave Pictou on return to Charlottetown about two o'clock.

—Attention is directed to the advertisement calling a meeting of the Liberal-Conservatives of Charlottetown and Royalty for Monday evening next in the Lyceum. The meeting is called to nominate candidates. There should be a large attendance.

—The last meeting of the Cheese Board for the season was held to-day. There were 2300 cheese boarded, 1100 of which were sold. Mr. Biffin bought Hazelbrook, Winsloe, Lakeville, St. Peter's and New Glasgow for 10 5-16c.; Mr. Horace Haszard bought Ked House and Lot 16 for 10 3-16c.

—A meeting of the Fair Association was held this forenoon, Arthur Simpson, Esq., President, in the chair. The expenses of the directors to date were ordered to be paid, and also balance of salary to Mr. Morrow, inspector. The secretary-treasurer was advised to ask both government for balance due the Association.

—The question of the day is what has taken Premier Farquharson off to Ottawa? Some say it is to get an ocean steamship to come here this fall. Others think, perhaps more correctly, that he wants to get a promise with reference to an increase of subsidy or at least an excuse for the failure of arbitration.

—The committee promoting the soldiers monument had a meeting in Judges Chambers yesterday afternoon. The subscription committee reported the collections to date and said that circulars and subscription lists were to be sent to school teachers throughout the province. Some designs of the monument were submitted, but pending further information action was not taken.

—In to-day's EXAMINER will be found the beginning of a very interesting story, "Ray's Recruit," by Capt. Charles King. This story is one of the best yet written by this popular author, and not long ago was the complete novel in Lippincott's, an honor which falls to no author whose work is not up to a high standard. We can promise our readers a good deal of pleasure if they will read this tale.

—At the Liberal convention last night Mr. J. F. Whelan was nominated as assemblyman. In the absence from the province of Mr. Rogers the nomination of a councillor was not proceeded with. Mr. Rogers has been communicated with by telegraph, and should he decline to become a candidate it is understood that Mr. Geo. E. Hughes will be chosen. Pending a reply from Mr. Rogers, the convention stands adjourned until Monday night.

—The death of Mr. William Hogan, of Waltham, Mass., is reported. Mr. Hogan, who was about 47 years of age, apparently fell off the train while going from Waltham to Boston, and had both legs taken off below the knees. He was picked up on the railway track unconscious and taken to the hospital where he passed away. The deceased was a brother of Mr. M. P. Hogan of Charlottetown, who tells his brother's death very keenly.

—Another edition. It is pleasing to learn that Miss Annie Mellish's book "Our Boys Under Fire," has had such a large sale throughout the provinces that another edition is called for at such an early date. We understand this edition will include the final home-coming of the volunteers and give many more incidents in connection with the lives of our soldier boys on active service. The book will be out in time for the Christmas trade and will make dainty and suitable gifts for friends abroad.

Mr. Foster, who left St. John for Ottawa a few days ago, is not making much talk about his own political future. The Conservative papers in Ontario appear to think that he will be sure to accept a seat and return to the House at an early day.
