

# St. Laurent Reveals He Ruled Spy Story Secret

OTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister St. Laurent disclosed Thursday he personally imposed government secrecy on the expulsion of a Soviet diplomat on spying attempts, maintaining the incident was not "very alarming."

First announcement of the election of Gennadi Popov, Soviet embassy second secretary, came last Monday, 72 days after the government demanded Russian Ambassador Dmitri Chuvahin that Popov be sent home.

Mr. St. Laurent's story broke last weekend by a charge by the Pan-Canadian Anti-Communist League that Popov and Victor Selivanov, em third secretary, had attempted to gain military secrets from James Stanley Staples, a Rockcliffe air station civilian clerk.

The government's brief announcement that Popov had been withdrawn from Canada came a few hours after newspapers carried excerpts of the league's 9,000-

word brief.

**PEARSON INVESTIGATING**

The brief which charged that seven embassy officials including Ambassador Chuvahin had engaged in "inadmissible activities," demanded closer government surveillance over the Russians' activities.

External Affairs Minister Pearson, to whom the brief was addressed, returned Thursday from a month-long trip to Europe, but declined to comment on the Popov affair.

Asked why the announcement was delayed, he said: "That's what I want to look into. I want to find out exactly the procession of events."

A little later in the day, Mr. St. Laurent arrived by train from his summer home at St. Patrick, Que., and told reporters he personally investigated the case.

He said the government is now conducting a month-long investigation of the spy story.

**SPYING NOT NEW**

Were Britain and the United

States informed of Canada's action? he was asked. Mr. St. Laurent declined to answer. He was scheduled to hold a press conference late today. It appeared likely he would go into further details at that time.

Staples, who tipped authorities to Popov's espionage attempts, is preparing to quit the city. He was fired from his Rockcliffe job and later his subsequent apprentice-accountant appointment voluntarily.

Mr. St. Laurent, touching on his reasons for maintaining the 72 days of secrecy, said governments have always tried to get information from each other.

The Canadian government had not approved of Popov's methods but many Canadians had realized that similar activities had been pursued ever since the 1945 spy exposures of Igor Gouzenko, Russian embassy code clerk who fled to the Canadian government.



## OLD SOURIS LANDMARK

## Meeting Of Disaster Relief Committee Held At Montague

The disaster relief committee, consisting of Mr. Gordon MacDonald, Miss Iphigene Arsenault and Mrs. Evelyn Cudmore of Charlottetown visited the Montague unit on Wednesday night.

The meeting was presided over by the chairman, Judge J. S. DesRoches, who welcomed the Charlottetown group. The regular business session was held, after which Miss Arsenault gave an outline of the Red Cross work which is being carried on during the present term.

Judge DesRoches reported on the work which had been done in the Montague area during the past year, and mentioned that two families had received assistance after losing their homes by fire. The assistance in each case was to small children He then thanked the Charlottetown unit for its assistance. He also thanked Miss Florrie Beaton, Mr. Gilbert Clements and his co-chairman, Mr. Fuit Campbell for their valued assistance.

Miss Arsenault mentioned the co-operation between nations as well as communities, in time of disaster, and the local organizations which participated in this co-operation, such as: Junior Red Cross training for future leaders, handicapped children's Fund, Mission, National Film Board services, first aid posts, swimming and water safety, and many others.

Fire Chief Doug Coffin mentioned in his report that the fire department was ready to assist the disaster relief committee in every way.

Mrs. Cudmore congratulated the Montague Fire Department for being the only fire department in the Province to have first aid training and artificial respiration training.

To keep this work up to a high standard, she suggested a refresher course be taken. This, with the co-operation of the citizens of Montague, should prove of invaluable service in time of disaster.

Mr. Gilbert Clements followed with a report on the swimming and water safety classes. Approximately 98 persons took the course out of which 39 received certificates, with six receiving Royal Life Saving Awards. The Town Council, which supported this project, has donated \$100.00 to help defray the cost. Hearty thanks was tendered to them for their support.

It is interesting to note that 1,500 persons were enrolled in the swimming and water safety classes. Among them was a mother from Piusville with nine daughters, who started the summer as a beginner and ended the season winning her bronze medalion. When asked why she was taking the course she replied, "so I will be able to look after my children."

A vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Clements for his efforts in this successful project.

Mr. MacDonald congratulated the local group on the work they had done, and brought up several points on accident relief and prevention, particularly in the home. Statistics show that fifty per cent of accidents occur in the home, and of these seventy per cent of the victims are men. In the month of July 23 accident victims were admitted to the Kings Co. Hospital, many of which could have been prevented.

Mr. MacDonald also said, that at one of the 36 first aid posts, 367 victims had been treated to date.

## Career Of Liar Reaches Climax

NEW YORK (AP)—Harvey M. Matusow's career as a professional liar was climaxed Wednesday by his conviction on five federal counts of perjury. He once starred for the government as an anti-Communist witness.

A jury of 10 men and two women found the 29-year-old Matusow guilty of lying on behalf of 13 second-string Communist leaders. Sentencing was set for Friday. The maximum is 25 years in prison.

The verdict was an exoneration of Roy M. Cohn, the controversial former chief counsel of the Senate sub-committee once headed by Senator Joseph R. McCarthy Rep.—wis.

Matusow helped convict the 18 second-string Red leaders. Cohn, then an assistant United States attorney, helped prosecute them.

Then Matusow recanted, said his original testimony had been shot through with lies and accused Cohn of inducing him to bear false witness to help the case against the Reds. It was this recantation and the charge against Cohn that was the basis for the perjury indictment.

Matusow, himself, confessed to having long been a "vicious liar."
