## Packhouse Union Head Guest Speaker At Dinner

"Honest thinking on all problems is a world that is diminishing in size through swift transportation makes us realize that our neighbors problems are ours," international Union President Ralph Helstein of Chicago said in an address before 250 members and guests of U.P.W.A. Local 282 (Canada Packers) last evening in the Community Centre.

"I am well aware that the economy of P.E. Island is agricultural and that a vast amount of the business done here is rural. 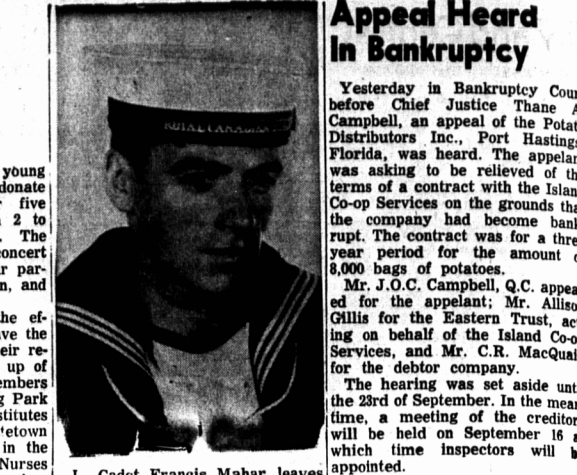

## Ch'town And District Exceed Blood Objective As 510 Donors Register

To the strains of the delightful music provided by the RECCE Band who gave a concert at the Charlottetown Armouries last evening, 310 residents of Charlottetown and the surrounding districts gave their blood and totalled up 510 for the day. 54 reported in the morning 146 in the afternoon and 310 in the evening. Before giving the concert at the Armouries, the RECCE Band played for a street parade of Blood Donors sponsored by the Charlottetown Kinsmen's Club and featuring Charlottetown's Centennial float. Kindly donated by the City for the occasion, with Mr. Ged Maddigan who last night made his 110th blood donation, seated on the throne as "King of Blood Donors." He was accompanied by his "Courtiers" 18 per cent of the donors registered at yesterday's clinics were new ones who had never reported before, and 29 per cent of the total number were from districts outside Charlottetown. One young couple, both anxious to donate their blood, brought their five boys ranging in ages from 2 to 13 years - along with them. The boys enjoyed the band concert while they waited until their parents had made their donation, and all had a jolly time.

Excellent assistants for the efficient mobile team, who leave the Province this morning on their return to Halifax, were made up of High School Red Cross Members at the morning clinic, Spring Park and Parkdale Women's Institutes in the afternoon, and Charlottetown Red Cross Corps members in the evening, together with local Nurses who assisted throughout the day.

The grand total of 1278 donors registered for the week is just 78 short of the objective of 1,350 for this week. It is a very creditable result and shows what can be done by co-operative effort which was displayed on all sides during the four days of clinics.



## Appeal Heard In Bankruptcy

Yesterday in Bankruptcy Court before Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, an appeal of the Potat Distributors Inc., Port Hastings, Florida, was heard. The appellant was asking to be relieved of the terms of a contract with the Island Co-op Services on the grounds that the company had become bankrupt. The contract was for a three year period for the amount of 8,000 bags of potatoes.

Mr. J.O.C. Campbell, Q.C. appeared for the appellant; Mr. Allison Gillis for the Eastern Trust, acting on behalf of the Island Co-op Services, and Mr. C.R. MacQuid for the debtor company.

The hearing was set aside until the 23rd of September. In the meantime, a meeting of the creditors will be held on September 16 at which time inspectors will be appointed.

## Agreement On Rubber Wages

CLEVELAND (AP) - Beating a threatened midnight strike deadline by less than one hour, negotiators for the CIO United Rubber Workers and the Firestone Tire and Rubber Co. Tuesday night reached a tentative contract agreement affecting 22,000 workers in eight United States cities. The settlement provides for a general increase of 12 cents an hour.

Under the old agreement which expired at midnight, Firestone's American workers received an average hourly rate of \$2.20. The new agreement calls for special adjustments above the general increase for an unspecified number of employees, one additional paid holiday, an improved vacation plan for employees with 11 to 15 years of service, and free hospitalization and surgical insurance for retired employees on pensions.

## Post-Graduate Courses In Law Urged

OTTAWA (CP) - Chief Justice J. C. McRuer of the Supreme Court of Ontario Thursday urged authorities responsible for legal education to provide law students with post-graduate training in specialized fields of law.

The day of the legal specialist is here and this should be recognized, he told the legal education section at the Canadian Bar Association's annual meeting.

"The general (law) practitioner has more right to undertake a law suit for which he is not trained than a general medical practitioner has to attempt to take out a brain tumor."

The time had come to stop writing treatises on legal education and to do something to overcome the danger of a creeping decay in the legal profession.

POST-GRADUATE COURSE

Justice McRuer proposed a three-year post-graduate course giving law students both practical and academic training.

Law students with post-graduate training should receive specialist degrees in advocacy, corporation law, taxation, estate management, insurance and other fields. The public then would know that certain lawyers were trained to handle affairs requiring specialized knowledge.

"It is unfortunate that in Canada the only post-graduate course recognized by the law societies is the course of bitter experience at the expense of the client," he said.

WOULD SPLIT JOBS

Justice McRuer also opposed the Canadian practice of fusing the jobs of barristers-lawyers who appear in court-and solicitors-those who do "the office work."

"In Canada we do not have the division of the profession between barristers and solicitors. We may never have it but I doubt if we will ever have a legal system comparable to that of Great Brit-

At the afternoon session Mr. Norman MacDonald, addressed the teachers on literature in the senior grades, pointing out that literature cannot be entirely recreational and that choral speaking in the public school is very helpful. He also said that there is too much emphasis placed on writing poems rather than reciting them.

Mr. Ross, the local supervisor, discussed various problems that might arise during the school year, several scientific experiments were performed which were helpful to all the teachers.

The meeting then adjourned for the first day.
