Cabinet To Meet At Tyne Valley

Nine cabinet ministers including Lloyd MacPhail, PC 2nd Queens, will hold the biggest Provincial Cabinet meeting in history at Tyne Valley this morning at 10 o'clock.

Mr. MacPhail was recently appointed to fill the cabinet posts of minister of industry and natural resources and minister of tourist development. His appointment followed a large scale shifting of cabinet posts when Hon. J. D. Stewart announced his resignation from the cabinet.

However, Mr. Stewart, who does not leave officially until June 14, will also attend in his capacities as Provincial Secretary, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Minister of Tourist Development.

The Tyne Valley Cabinet meeting will be the first stage in a tour of West Prince to be made by members of the government. After the meeting they will have luncheon at the Royal Canadian Legion home there. Following the lunch the official motorcade stops at the Mt. Pleasant airport as well as in Alberton, Tignish and O'Leary.

Members of the Cabinet, headed by Premier Walter R. Shaw, will thus have an opportunity of looking over developments which have already taken place or which are now underway. These will include the lobster packing plants, tobacco farms, the proposed new cultural foundation for summer use, the blueberry co-operative and the Alberton marine railway.

An Ellerslie member said, "the AYERS don't want to be preached to, need more variety and teaching leadership." Kensington said there was a "problem of leadership for junior groups and lack of interest from the parents."

PWC Science Instructors Win Awards

The Atlantic Province Inter-University Committee on the sciences has awarded \$1,000 summer scholarships to Prince of Wales College science instructors Keir L. Adams and S. Geoffrey Moore, it was announced yesterday.

Mr. Adams will do research with Dr. L. R. C. Barclay at Mount Allison University and Mr. Moore with Dr. J. E. Blanchard of Dalhousie.

Eleven such awards were made by the committee, Dr. W. R. Trost, dean of graduate studies at Dalhousie and chairman of APICS, said. Total value is \$9,675.

APICS is supported by grants in aid from the National Research Council and from the provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

It was urged that the missionary projects money be sent to the convener, Helen Piercy. The group also discussed the AYP A conference to be held in Crepsud Sept. 4, 5 and 6. The theme of the conference will be "The Anglican World Mission." The time table was discussed and changes made. Suggestions for the coming conference were also discussed. Collection amounted to \$2.50. A lunch was served by St. Lukes AYP A. The next meeting of the Deanery AYP A Council will be held July 6 at Summerside.

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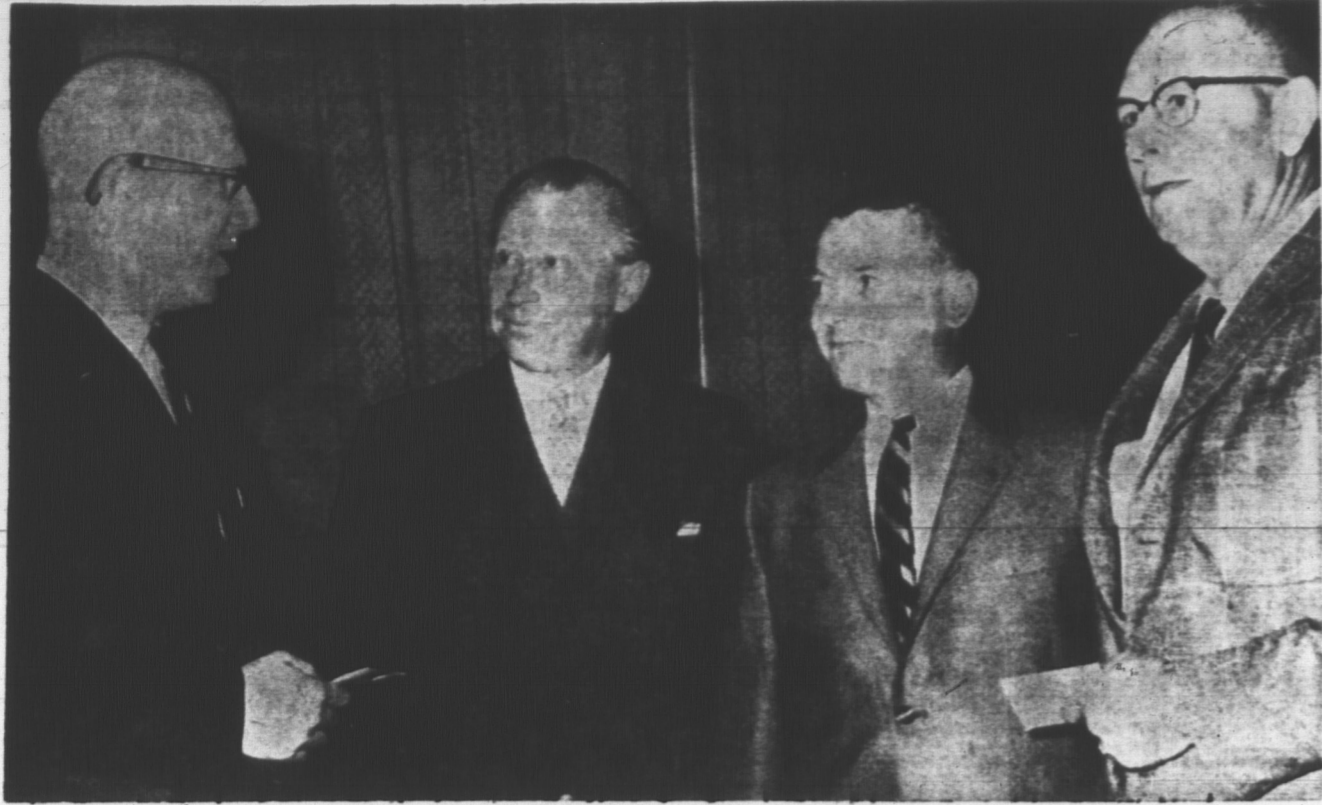

Board Of Trade Area Annual Set For Tonight

MONTAGUE — The annual dinner meeting of the Montague Regional Board of Trade will be held this evening at the Kingsway Hotel at seven o'clock.

Guest speaker for the dinner will be Andrew B. MacRae, minister of agriculture for the province.

During the past year the board has been active and has taken part in many of the projects and proposed projects for the area. Most recently members were instrumental in the formation of the Brudenell Golf Course which is now being made ready for use by some one hundred members. The proposed Kings By-Way, all weather roads and several other matters pertaining to the area have been supported by the board.

The new slate of officers will be elected and several subjects of importance to the area discussed. It is expected a large crowd will be present for the meeting.

Three Attend Law Session

A conference on prevention of crime and law enforcement held in Toronto was attended by Deputy Attorney General Arthur McGuigan who returned over the weekend.

Also attending the four-day conference from this province were: Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, of the Supreme Court, and Judge C. St. Clair Trainor, Judge of Queens County Court.

Youth Gets Two Months

A sentence of two months in Queens County jail will be served by George Augustus Paquette, 17, of New Glasgow, having previously pleaded guilty to three charges of theft (all under \$50) and one charge of attempted theft.

He has been given a two month sentence on each count, but they are to be served concurrently. The youth appeared before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queens County Magistrate's Court Monday morning.

John Clifford MacDonald of Upper Montague was remanded to June 30 on a charge of impaired driving to which he previously pleaded not guilty. Three men and one woman were fined \$20 and costs or 30 days for unlawful possession of liquor, and three men were fined \$20 and costs or 15 days for being intoxicated in a public place. Two Indians were each fined \$10 and costs or five days for being intoxicated off the reserve.

Businessmen Given Hints From Quebec

TORONTO (CP) — Businessmen opening plants in Quebec must make sure they create an atmosphere where French Canadians can feel at home and hope to get to the top if they are competent, Gerard Plourde, president of the United Auto Parts Inc., said Monday.

He told the 94th annual meeting of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association that businessmen "must be aware of the French fact and understand the political and social function of their enterprise has changed."

"This is the price you have to pay if the French Canadian is to feel economically happy in the future," he told industrialists from across the country.

The French Canadian is tired of being on the outside looking in. He wants to participate, to be able to influence important decisions and to make decisions at the high level of the business community."

In the political field, Mr. Plourde said, it appears to be Ottawa's view that provinces should be large administrative bodies, getting their funds largely through the central authority.

"It should be obvious by now that this will not satisfy Quebec."

He said Canadian leaders must show they are ready to review the constitution and "recognize once again for all that Quebec is not a province like the others."

REOPEN EMBASSY OTTAWA (CP) — The Canadian embassy reopened business offices in the rebel-held area of Santo Domingo during the weekend. The chancery was closed April 26, two days after a rebel revolt began in the Dominican Republic.

Seized Gold Bars And Coins Help India's Reserve Fund

NEW DELHI (Reuters) — Thousands of gold bars and coins seized from smugglers by India's customs officers are being used to boost India's reserves and stave off a foreign exchange crisis.

They have been placed in vaults of India's reserve bank to raise the country's gold reserves.

During the last five years the customs officers have seized 130,000,000 rupees (\$29,250,000) worth of gold smuggled in by land, air or sea. But this is only about one-tenth of the total gold smuggled into India.

Statistics issued Friday showed India is facing its worst foreign-exchange crisis since it became independent in 1947. Foreign assets declined last week to a record low level of 773,400,000 rupees (\$174,000,000).

Profits for gold smugglers are high in India. The gold price here is twice that of the rest of the world because of the demand for gold for jewelry, dowries and hoarding.

Smugglers have tried all ways to get gold into the country. It has been moved in typewriters, cameras, food cans, paint on cars or trunks, in solid gold buttons stitched to entire wardrobes of clothes, in waistbands and in padded jackets.

HIDDEN IN HAIR One woman was caught with more than \$2,500 worth of gold hidden in her long hair.

Camels and camel drivers crossing the border from Pakistan have been dosed with castor oil to reveal any gold they may have swallowed.

Smuggling also is carried on by dhows, Arab sailing vessels, and motorboats along the Indian coast.

Smugglers dump gold in the sea offshore and local fishermen row out to pick it up.

Six years ago a big international racket was broken when a steward of an international airline was caught in Calcutta smuggling gold bars from his aircraft.

Gold smuggling appears to be waning slightly since the government last year banned gold hoarding and the manufacture of gold ornaments of more than 14-carat content.

Its death blow may be hastened if the Indian customs States invention that emits a bird-like whistle whenever it is placed near gold.

A resident of Summerside was arraigned on a charge of intoxication in a public place and drew a fine of \$20 and costs.

Gabriel Chaisson Will Instruct At N. Rustico

Music instructor for July at the Columbia Cultural Centre in North Rustico will be Gabriel Chaisson, a Summerside music teacher.

Mr. Chaisson is president of the P. E. I. Music Teachers' Federation for 1964-66 and recently represented this province at the national convention of music educators in Calgary.

He received his early education in New Brunswick and after attending the New Brunswick Teachers College in Fredericton, taught at Sacred Heart University in Bathurst.

He then attended Mt. Allison University, where he was conductor of the university's symphony orchestra for two years before graduating with his Bachelor of Music degree. Prior to coming to Summerside he taught two years at the Mt. Allison Conservatory.

Mr. Chaisson formed the first Sea Cadet Band in Summerside. The Columbia Cultural Centre is a new venture sponsored by the Knights of Columbus. The centre plans to operate two courses, one July 4-13, one July 18-27, with the program including day and evening classes in music, art and drama, physical education swimming, and concerts by choirs, bands, orchestras, and possibly locally produced dramas.
