Morning Stock Letter

(Received over Pittfield and Co's Private Wire) NEW YORK, June 30—Foreign exchanges this morning are about the same as they have been the last few days. Sterling is 5.02 9-16 French franc 6.30. There is considerable publicity being given to the attempt by Mr. Lewis to unionize steel labor and the challenge of the steel industry to Mr. Lewis' attempt. This situation will probably be front page news for some time to come. Dividend meetings scheduled for today are Allied Chemical and American Can. Since 1920 the month of July in almost every case has witnessed an advancing market if not for the whole month at least for part of the month. Except in July 1931

which immediately followed a sharp rally as a result of the Hoover Memorandum. July markets have been satisfactory. Of course, in July 1933 there was a sharp break in the market in the middle of July last, in the latter part of July 1933 the market did better. MONTREAL, June 30—Foundation Company Canada statement for the fiscal year ended April 30, 1936, showed a net loss of \$2,018 compared with \$9,055 in the previous year. Of more significance than the actual figures is the statement in the directors report that "during the fiscal year, the company secured a volume of new business exceeded in only two previous years of the company's history."

LIVESTOCK

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, June 30—Cattle offerings were light and prices steady in early dealings on Montreal livestock markets today. Calf, sheep and hog sections were also steady. Receipts, cattle 55; calf 587; sheep and lambs 245; hog 587. Cattle offered were of common to medium quality cows and bulls. A few good cows brought \$4 with medium kinds from \$3.25 to \$3.75 and canners and cutters from \$3.75 to \$4.50. While common bulls ranged from \$2.75 to \$3.50. Good calves brought \$6 to \$6.50 with medium good kinds at \$5.50 and fair to medium kinds from \$4.75 to \$5.25. Grass calves were \$3.50. Medium good to good spring lambs sold for \$9.50 with culls at \$7.50. Sheep were \$3.50. Bacon was \$9.60 to \$9.75 fed and watered while butchers drew \$1.10 per hog weight. Butchers, heavy and light, were \$9.10 to \$9.25 and extra heavies \$8.60 to \$8.75 while feeders went at \$9.50 to \$12. Sows were from \$6 to \$7.

GRAIN

(Canadian Press) CHICAGO, July 1—Unconfirmed reports that much of Canada's wheat area is threatening to duplicate the drought have in United States spring crop territory whittled all grain values skyward today. Almost 5 cents a bushel rise was scored by wheat at Minneapolis, wheat in Chicago skyrocketed 3 1-3 cents, and corn, oats and barley here outdid previous high price records for the season. Chicago wheat prices closed flurried at almost the day's top level, 3 cents to 3 3-8 cents above yesterday's finish, July 95 3-4 7-8, Sept. 96 7-3 to 87, Dec 96 1-2 1-2, as 1 1-2 to 1 3-4 up. Sept 92 1-4 to 3-8, rye 2 1-2 to 2 3-8 higher, Sept. 95 5-8, and barley showing 1 1-4 cents bulge. In provisions, the outcome was unchanged, a rise of 1/8 cent.

Currencies

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, July 1—Sterling and the Canadian dollar were higher, the French franc lower in the foreign exchange markets today. The pound was up 5-8 at 5.02 1-4 while the Dominion dollar reduced its discount from 1-4 to 7-32 per cent. The franc was off 5-16 at 6.63 1-16 cents.

NORTH BAY MECCA FOR TOURISTS

Million Dollar Quints Thrilled By First Band Music.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, June 29—The Dionne quintts, who have as much chance as normal babies to reach maturity, should be worth a million dollars each when they grow up. Dr. A. R. Dafoe estimated here today. The doctor who has looked after the children since their birth, is visiting Toronto. He explained summer plans for the nursery at Callander, named after him. An oval veranda, surrounding the playground, would be opened Wednesday which would enable visitors to see the children but will prevent the children from knowing they are being watched. Baby Marie's weak eyes, which have often appeared slightly crossed in photographs, are better now, Dr. Dafoe said. "It was just weakness of the muscles. She was unable to co-ordinate. Now, with proper diet and care, the muscles have strengthened and she no longer gets cross-eyed." The babies can climb around like monkeys but their conversation is still limited to "baby talk," he said. His name to them is "docteur." The doctor recalled a surgery operation he performed before he came into world prominence with birth of the Dionnes. A man was kicked by a horse and Dr. Dafoe was rushed to him. He wiggled a finger into the brain to clean out the barnyard debris that had been left by the horse's hoof. Then he worked the shattered skull back into place. The patient lived to die 20 years later. "But it wasn't very scientific," the doctor added.

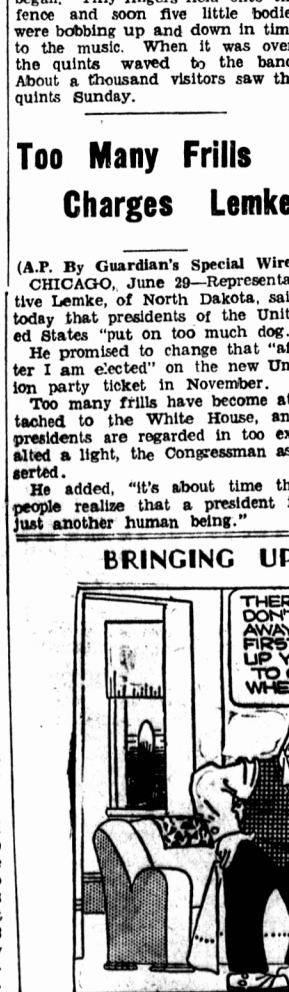
HEAR FIRST BAND
