Multi-Vehicle Crashes Reported On Weekend

SUMMERSIDE — Two car accidents were investigated in the eastern Prince County area over the weekend.

The most serious was a four-vehicle chain collision at De-sable early Saturday morning. Carrying out the investigation were the Borden RCMP.

The accident was attributed to the extremely treacherous driving conditions caused by freezing rain which turned the highways into a sheet of ice.

The accident occurred when an Irving Oil tanker truck, driven by Leland Joshua Murray of Charlottetown was unable to drive up the hill near the Blue Goose restaurant at De-sable. The vehicle was proceeding towards Charlottetown and the driver stopped midway up the hill to put on chains.

While he was stopped a 1958 model car proceeding in the direction of Borden and driven by James Leslie Hammill of Seven Mile Bay, collided with the front of the oil truck.

A 1963 model car driven by James Alex Ferguson of Victoria then sideswiped Hammill's vehicle, and a fourth vehicle, proceeding in the general direction of Charlottetown and

station wagon was estimated to be \$380 but no damage estimates were given on the other two vehicles involved.

Traffic Slows In Souris Ice

SOURIS — Freezing rain made highway travel hazardous and slowed traffic here Saturday.

The Canadian National Railways express truck, which arrived in Souris about 12.45 p.m., was about two and one-half hours behind schedule.

The Island Motor Transport bus, scheduled to leave for Charlottetown at 8.15 a.m., did not leave Souris until around noon.

The driver said he lost control of the vehicle three times between Souris and Elmira, where the bus spends the night.

The bus was on schedule on its return trip in the evening, however.

Moncrieff Williamson, director of the Confederation Art Gallery and Museum, will speak at the New Brunswick Museum Wednesday, Feb. 17.

His subject will be "People in Their Setting: A Study in Portraiture". The lecture is presented by the museum's department of art and is free of charge.

Mr. Williamson is a council member of the Canadian Museums Association, a fellow of the International Institute of Arts and Letters and a member of the International Council of Museums. He was recently appointed chairman of the newly-formed Atlantic Provinces Art Circuit, and fellow of the Royal Society of Arts.

His address in Fredericton will deal with the human element in art — particularly the history of portrait painting, and the direction portraits have taken in the 20th century.

Two Professors Attend Session Of Music Ass'n

Agriculture Minister Wants Dairy Support Maintained

Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said Saturday he wants to see the dairy support price continued for farmers if the ban on margarine sales in the province is lifted.

He said the support price system is renewable annually and this annual renewal system "does not supply any large measure of security for farmers."

There has been speculation that action may be taken at the session of the legislature, which opens Thursday, to allow legal sale of margarine. Prince Edward Island is the only province in Canada which prohibits its sale.

He said he would also be concerned in seeing that margarine

consumers were well aware of the ingredients of the butter substitute.

The minister said that some brands of margarine are made from good vegetable oils which make up a product pretty close in taste to butter. He added, however, that other types of oils being used in margarine manufacture can produce an inferior product.

Mr. MacRae agreed with Premier Walter R. Shaw that it is very likely that the margarine question will be discussed in the legislature. He said "if the people's representatives vote to allow the sale of margarine, a bill could be brought in to repeal the section of the Dairy Industry Act which prohibits its sale."

Mr. MacRae said, however, that he would not promote such a bill.

P.E.I. Driver Examiners Attend Meet

John Schurman, chief driver examiner for P.E.I., and Joseph Clark, driver examiner for Summerside, recently attended an examiners' conference in Fredericton.

The conference, held to ensure uniformity in drivers' license tests in New Brunswick, was attended by the P.E.I. examiners because of the similarities in examining procedures in the two provinces.

Examining procedures and new methods of examining were discussed. Lectures were conducted by C. Preston Poore of the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators, Washington, D.C., and N.B. Motor Vehicle Branch staff members Donald Lee, chief driver examiner, and H.W. Kirk, highway safety co-ordinator.

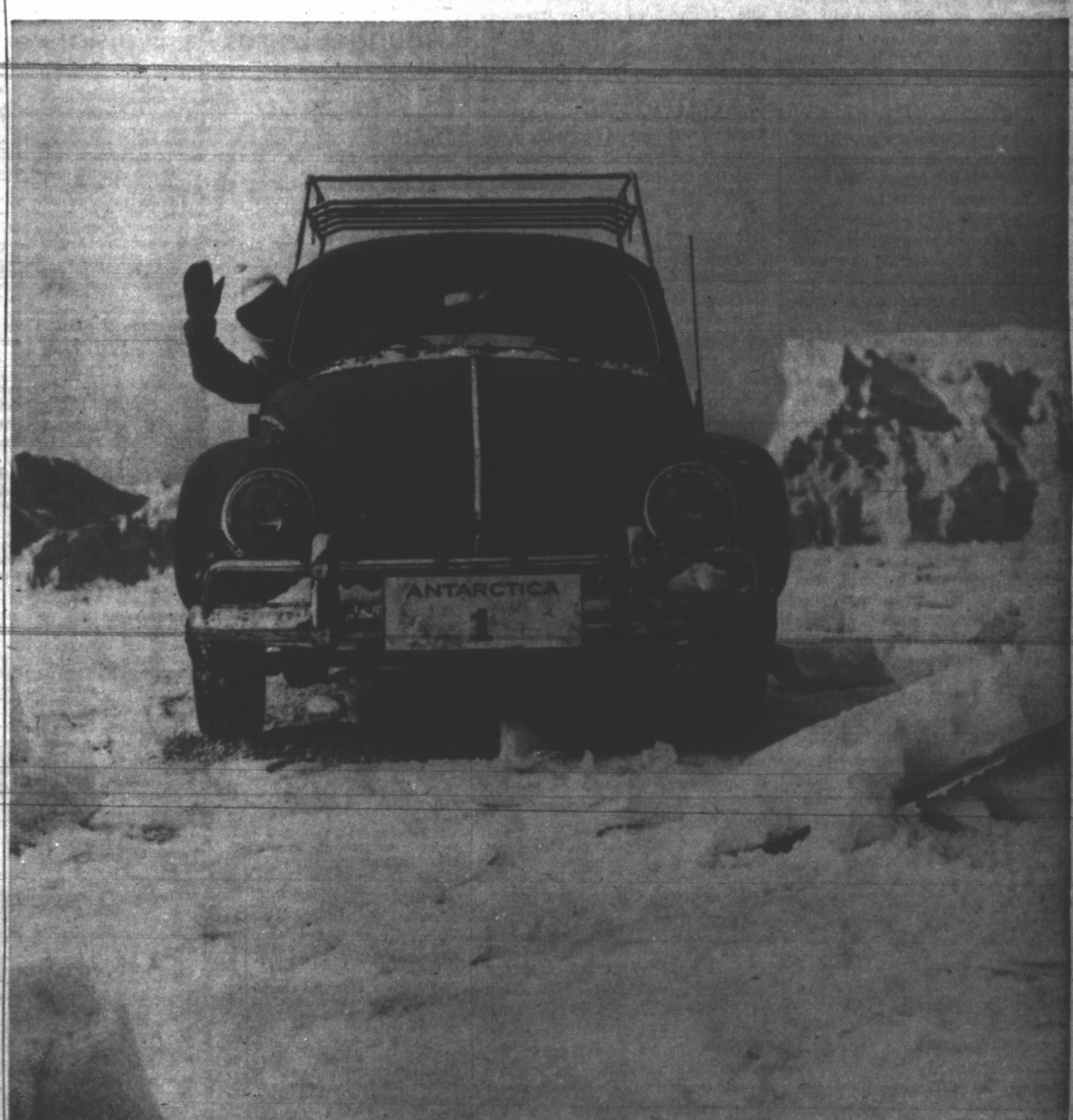
HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says Sunday was sunny and very cold throughout most of Eastern Canada in the Maritimes Liverpool and Yarmouth in Nova Scotia reported the highest afternoon temperature readings with 17 degrees. Charlottetown failed to rise about 8 degrees and in New Brunswick Chatham had the highest afternoon reading with 14 degrees.

A ridge of high pressure now centered over the mouth of the Bay of Fundy will cross the district during the night and maintain the generally clear skies. In the wake of the high pressure area today's temperatures will gradually moderate and skies will begin to cloud over from the southwest late in the day over the western regions.

Regional forecasts:
Northern N.S., Prince Edward Island, Eastern N.B. Counties, Bay of Chaleur: Sunny and not quite so cold; light winds. Low-high at New Glasgow zero and 20 above, Charlottetown and Moncton 3 below and 20 above, Campbellton 10 below and 20 above.
