Stock Market Plunge Sharpest Since 1929



Stock markets throughout the world plunged sharply in the wake of news that fighting had broken out in Korea. The same news brought advances in grain, commodity and livestock prices. Toronto and New York stock exchanges registered the largest single-day declines since the 1929 crash as wave after wave of selling orders sent prices reeling downward. Four out of five stocks traded in Toronto and nine out of ten stocks traded in New York declined although the retreat was orderly. NEWSY NOTES - By Agricola

THE CLIFF SWALLOW

The Northern Cliff Swallow, to give its full name, is a handsome bird with a coat of many colors. Before the House Sparrows came these were the commonest of the Island swallows; their gourd-shaped nests plastered along under the eaves of the barn, were a feature of every farm. Then in 1886, the House Sparrows appeared in Charlottetown, and soon over-ran the Island. They speedily drove the swallows from their nests, which they occupied. Once the Sparrows got established, the Swallows forsook the locality. The 1916 Bulletin states that the Cliff Swallows was the commonest species at that date but local ornithologists tell me that it is rarer now, and that the Barn Swallow has taken its place. "The economic importance of the Swallows", writes C. W. Nash, "is very great; without them the smaller winged insects would multiply to such an extent as to become an unbearable nuisance to men and animals; for it is, I believe, to these birds chiefly that we are indebted for our freedom from the swarms of midges, black flies, and gnats of various kinds". In some localities there is a belief that Swallows "carry bedbugs", but there is no foundation for this. Like all other living things, Swallows have their parasites, but these are not bedbugs! Northern Cliff Swallow, locally Eave Swallow. AOU 612. Summer Resident, decreasing 1950. Plumage: Forehead creamy white, crown steel blue; throat and sides of head chestnut; a brownish-grey ring round the neck; breast brownish-grey tinged rufous, and with a steel blue patch in its centre; back steel blue, wings dusky like tail; upper tail coverts (rump) pale buffy, belly white; tail square. Length of adult 6.0 inches.

ANTIQUE FLAT-IRON

No Extension Of Shipping Subsidy

OTTAWA, June 30 - (CP) - Transport Minister Chevrier said this week in the Commons there is no possibility of the Government extending its subsidy to the Canadian merchant marine beyond the end of the current fiscal year. He told Howard Green (PC-Vancouver, Quira) that when Prime Minister St. Laurent announced a \$3,000,000 subsidy for the merchant marine Dec. 9 last it was made clear the subsidy would be for one year only. There had been no change in that decision. Nine ships now are tied up, compared with 42 prior to announcement of the subsidy. No money has yet been paid to Canadian ship operators but applications for assistance by more than 30 have been approved. Mr. Chevrier said 95 Canadian-owned ships have been transferred to United Kingdom registry. Mr. Green also sought information on the North Atlantic Shipping Commission Board. Mr. Chevrier said he could give such information about the Board for security reasons. It was established to form an Allied shipping pool for use in an emergency.

THE SKY IN JULY, 1950

Venus is now a bright morning star conspicuous before sunrise, in the east. Since only 75 per cent of its disc is illuminated, it is not as bright as it can be. On July 3, there is a fairly close conjunction of the Moon and Jupiter, about 9.30 p. m. On the 5th the Earth (Terra) is in Aphelion, distant from the Sun 94,450,000 miles. THE ZOETROPE

About that time (1875?) a relative bought me a zoetrope: this was an optical toy but it was the forerunner of the "movies". It consisted of a tin cylinder, 12 inches in diameter and about 9 inches deep, revolving on a base. The top was open and there was a series of vertical slots, about 4 inches long, round the top of the cylinder. A number of pictorial scrolls, (36 by 4 inches) went with the machine: these depicted all the various stages of some particular movement. One of these scrolls displayed the acts of a horse jumping a fence: when this was placed in the cylinder, facing inward, and the contraption revolved (by hand), a glance through the slots showed the horse in action. It appeared to rise from the ground, vault the fence and land safely on the other side. It was the motion which deceived the eye by blending the successive pictures of the horse. Many years passed before the camera caught up with this simple toy, but when it did the "movies" were the result.

NATURE NOTES

It was almost dark when I noticed something fluttering in the grass, just outside the door. I made a grab and found it was a biggish moth, apparently just out of the pupa stage. It turned out to be a Striped Morning Sphinx Moth, (Celerio lineata), an insect already on my record. Its wings are narrow and pointed like those of the Hawkmoths. It's forewings are brownish striped buffy, while the smaller hind-wings are rather vinaceous, heavily margined brown. I am uncertain as to what food-plant its caterpillar attacks in P. E. I.

The "Flat Pea", (Lathyrus sylvaticus), is growing as strongly as ever though it was planted, as seed, a year or two before the War. This plant attracted attention some years ago when old-timers in other Provinces boomed it as a never-failing pasture and hay plant. The Bird's-foot Trefoll, (Lotus), has come into bloom and its yellow pea-shaped flowers are decidedly ornamental. But the "vines" are much too short to be of any value as feed. They are said, however, to grow 24 inches long in B. C.

Along the "Creek", (brook), I notice many colonies of the "Tall Yellow Flag" or Iris. This is a British plant, the Iris, (Pseudocorus of Linnaeus, and the Flow-er is of a clear sunny yellow.
