Can you tell me where to write to find a good man?

DEAR MARY: I'm sorry but I can't tell you where to write to find a good husband. I don't have that brand of second-sight. Furthermore, even if I had, the editorial policy of this column subscribes explicitly to the line against promoting a so-called lonely hearts interchange between strangers. However, it is a matter of general knowledge that there are some few supposedly reliable male-finding agencies in the nation, that will list male and female prospects for a fee and try to pair them off who are practically safe, suitable, congenial companions. These agencies are pledged, I understand, to provide introductions of male and female contacts, once the applicants' credentials have been carefully double-checked and approved, as to their mental, physical, moral and social fitness (presumably for marriage).

But, these agencies, which introduce you to prospective mates in terms of leading to courtship, romance, or marriage, often being introduced, the clients are on their own, to succeed or fail; although it seems to read from articles I've read that some agencies, at least, agree to provide two or more introductions per client in exchange for the initial fee. To locate such an agency, if you are interested, you might write to the Reader's Digest magazine, Pleasantville, N.Y., and ask for a reprint of an article on this subject. For example, about a marriage broker service headquartered in the

mid-west, with branches elsewhere too. If reprints are no longer available, get the date when the magazine published the article and check the back magazine stacks of your local public library for a look at the original issue. Balenciaga Coats Are Biggest News

PARIS (AP)—Coats were the biggest news in the fall and winter collection of Balenciaga, shown Tuesday for buyers only. Recognized as the master of the French couture, Balenciaga along with Givenchy, sets rules that do not permit the press to see new fashions until weeks after collection-time.

New lengths coats, showing three inches at most of the skirt, made a big impression in the Balenciaga show. Many coats were collarless, and for afternoon and evening, all through the gold of the harvest - tie the crickets will be into their tunes. The small, rolled and pointed collar known to experts as "Balenciaga collar" may be on its way out. Many suit jackets were collarless, too, and had edge-to-edge closings, with fabric-lined buttonholes. Balenciaga showed deep, roomy sleeves on alinky coats. Several bloused coats were felt to be significant. They were slim, bloused only in back, and belted. A bloused-back purple afternoon coat had a tremendous black satin sash that tied at one side.

Suit jackets were said to be larger, longer and wider. Skirts were soft and skirred with pockets in the seams. There was no change in skirt length. It continues at a just-correct-knee-length level.
