

Robberies at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court.

DANIEL CARROLL and Terrence McAtee were examined at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this (Tuesday) morning, on a charge of stealing fourteen silver spoons, two silver butter knives, and one glass receiver from the dining room of the "Farmers' Arms," on the evening of the 31st ult. The evidence of Mr. Crabb, proprietor of the hotel was taken. He gave details of the robbery similar to those previously published, also his grounds for suspecting the prisoners, and identified the spoons found on Carroll's person as being the same as the one's taken from his dining room. Mr. Crabb's servant girl identified the prisoners, and testified that Carroll, McAtee, and another whom she did not know, entered the dining room about three o'clock on the 31st. She asked what they wanted, and they said a drink. She told them they would get it in the next room, and all went out. The prisoner McAtee returned to the dining room about 4.30, and again said he wanted a drink. He was told he could get none there, and he left. About five o'clock the girl left the kitchen and dining room and went up stairs. It was during her absence that the silverware was stolen. Sergeant McGregor testified to arresting and searching the prisoner Carroll, and finding on his person the two spoons identified by Mr. Crabb. He said Carroll could not account for having them on his person. The prisoner denied that he committed the robbery. He could not account for having part of the stolen goods in his pocket, other than he said they might have been put in by some person while he had his coat off during an altercation which took place on the day of the robbery, in the bar-room of the "Farmers' Arms." The City Marshall said the prisoner gave the same account to him on the evening he was arrested. There being no evidence against McAtee, both prisoners were discharged.

Lemuel White stood charged with stealing a wolf robe from the sleigh of Hon. D. Ferguson on the evening of the 2nd inst. Mr. Ferguson testified that on the above date the robe produced in Court was stolen from his sleigh, while standing in front of Mr. J. Scott's, Kent street. Mr. Albert Love, who was passing Queen street about six o'clock on the evening of the robbery, testified to seeing a fellow running out of Mr. Robert Crabb's gangway and into Mrs. Offer's yard, carrying with him a wolf robe. Thinking the robe was stolen, he informed Mr. Crabb of the fact and Mr. Crabb, in company with Mr. John Davis, went into Mrs. Offer's yard and found the robe hanging on the side of a manure bin. Mr. Crabb saw it was not his robe, and was about leaving when the prisoner rose out of the bin and walked towards the street. Mr. Davis ordered him to pick up the buffalo and leave it where he got it. The person did as requested, and carried it into Mr. Crabb's yard, where it was left till the owner was found. Mr. Crabb swore that the person was stupidly drunk when he came out of the bin, and had been drinking all the evening. The prisoner, in answer to the charge, said he had no recollection of seeing the robe; that he had been drinking on the day of the robbery. The Magistrate said, in the eye of the law drunkenness was no excuse for crime. He therefore sentenced the prisoner to one month's imprisonment with hard labor.

A POLITICAL MEETING was held at Rustico on Monday evening, the 12th inst., for the purpose of discussing the practicability of constructing a branch railway from Rustico to Hunter River, and the improvement of Rustico Harbor. The attendance was very large. The meeting was addressed by Mr. Brecken, M. P., Donald McKay, Esq., M. P. P., Messrs. Robertson, Gallant, Buot, Shaw, McInnis, and leading gentlemen of the district. The speeches were brief and to the point. A resolution in favor of a branch railway was adopted, and a committee appointed to collect statistics of the cost of constructing the branch. It is the intention of the inhabitants of Rustico to memorialize the Dominion Government regarding the matter. The memorial will be immediately drawn up and presented by Mr. Brecken at the coming session. A resolution, thanking Mr. Brecken for his attendance, was passed. The meeting, which was a most orderly and well-conducted one, then adjourned.

It resulted in a victory for the former by one point—he having made eighteen points, while the latter made seventeen. The first rink was composed of Col. McGill, Messrs. J. R. BERLIN, Jan. 12. Particular attention is now being paid here to the development of the affairs of France. It was hoped that time would relieve national antipathies and that war might be altogether avoided; but this hope has been much shaken by recent events in France.

The new French Cabinet, particularly Freycinet the Premier, is mistrusted, the latter being regarded as a creature of Gambetta.

LAHORE, Jan. 12. Herat and Balkh regiments of Afghans are preparing to march to Ghuznee to join Mahomed Jan.

DUBLIN, Jan. 12. Although the Government have summoned Davitt, Daly, Killen and Brennan to appear before the Court of Queen's Bench, it is not expected that any proceedings will be taken against them.

VIENNA, Nov. 12. The Presse is of opinion that a collision between Russia and England is inevitable. The Presse says that General Skobeloff recently declared at a banquet that Russia is on the eve of a national war.

OTTAWA, Jan. 12. Mr. Gibbs of Belleville, has been chosen by the liberals as candidate in West Hastings, in the local Legislature. Mr. Robertson, the unseated member, is the other candidate.

The Governor General leaves for Halifax on the 20th inst., to meet the Princess Louise.
