

Islanders Defeat Sydney 4-3 In Overtime Play At New Glasgow Last Night

NEW GLASGOW, (CP)—Charlottetown Islanders scored in overtime here Monday night to defeat Sydney Millionaires and throw cold water on Sydney's chances of tying for first place in the Maritime Major Hockey League.

Mud cancelled a game between Glouce Bay Miners and the league-leading Halifax Atlantics. Atlantics crossed the Strait of Canso but were unable to get to Glouce Bay for a game when their cars were mired at Port Hawkesbury.

Atlantics are only one game ahead of Millionaires, while Glouce Bay and Charlottetown lag well behind, 11 and 15 points respectively behind Sydney.

Charlottetown took an early lead when Orin Carver scored in the first minute of play. Claude Robert backed him up in the last minute of the first period.

Lorne Pirie of Sydney fired the lone goal of the second period.

Specs Chorley and Jean Renaud gave Sydney a 3-2 lead in the third, then Elwood Ritchie scored for Islanders and tied the game.

Vince Palladino banned a goal past Sydney goalie Norm Defelice in the third minute of the sudden-death overtime period.

The first period ended in a wild-swinging squabble between Palladino and Ray Lacroix. Both were tagged with majors and served

five minutes. Only three other penalties were handed out.

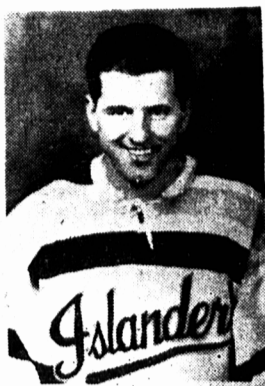

Canada Scores 8-0 Win Over Sweden; Tied With Czechs, Russians For Lead

STOCKHOLM, (CP)—Canada stayed with the leaders in the world hockey tournament Monday, blanking Sweden 8-0 for their third straight victory.

A crowd of 10,000 fans, by far the largest to date in the eight-team round robin tournament, watched Toronto East York hand the defending champions their first defeat. Czechoslovakia and Russia are tied with the Canadians in first place with 3-0 records.

Despite the loss of two defencemen through injuries and their most unfavorable record thus far in the penalty column, the Canadians never were in trouble against the Swedes, who won their title in the absence of opposition from Eastern Europe or North America.

Enjoying frequent manpower advantages as East York took seven penalties to their two, the Swedes seldom were able to organize their attack, even when they held a two-man edge for nearly 1 1/2 minutes during the second period.

Second Shutout
The winners pumped home three goals in each of the first two periods and added two more in the third. It was the third straight eight-goal game for East York and the second consecutive shutout for goalie Don Lockhart, who permitted his lone goal of the tournament late in the Canadians' first victory over Switzerland.

Sweden's King Gustav Adolf watched the game from the press box.

The forward line of Moe Galand, Norm Gray and Earl Clements took over the scoring honors Monday night with Galand, a former Oshawa and Stratford, Ont., junior, accounting for two goals and setting up a third by Clements. Gray added the line's fourth goal. Centre Bob Kennedy had his second two-goal night of the tournament and John Petro and Eric Unger each scored once.

East York's defensive ranks suffered in the second period when Doug Chapman was carried from the ice with a broken jaw and Harold Fiskari limped to the side-

lines after aggravating a knee injury.

Unable To Play
Chapman was hurt in a collision with a Swedish defenceman. Coach Greg Currie said the 23-year-old graduate from Oshawa junior ranks is through for the series. There was no indication when Fiskari would be able to play again.

In the other games Monday Czechoslovakia ran up the high-est score of the tournament, drubbing Finland 12-1. Russia's Moscow Dynamos had trouble with Germany for two periods before picking up four goals for a 6-3 victory.

The Russians and Czechs meet in today's featured game when Canada enjoys an open date. The Swedes take on Switzerland and Finland tackles Norway to complete the schedule.

EDMONTON, (CP)—Three rinks remained undefeated Monday night at the end of the second round of play in the Canadian curling championships.

Northern Ontario, Alberta and Ontario were at the top of the heap with two straight victories. Manitoba, Quebec, Saskatchewan and Prince Edward Island were next with one win and one loss apiece.

New Brunswick and British Columbia each have a loss but have only played one game.

Newfoundland and Nova Scotia trail with two straight losses.

Northern Ontario had little trouble Monday night disposing of Newfoundland 14-3 in the second round. Manitoba defeated Quebec 11-7. Alberta walloped Nova Scotia 23-4. Saskatchewan stopped New Brunswick 14-7, and Ontario had to go right down to the wire to defeat Prince Edward Island 9-8.

The Ontario-Prince Edward Island game caught the eye of the more than 2,000 fans in the Edmonton Gardens. Ontario was down 8-7 after the Maritime rink scored four on the 10th end. Skip Ross Tarlton drew up to an Island rock near the button with his last stone on the 11th to lay one and tie the score.

He was lying one on the last end when DE W. L. MacDonal of Charlottetown threw last rock through the house and the game was over.

In the afternoon Prince Edward Island had no trouble with Newfoundland which scored only four ends—one on the second, one on the seventh, one on the ninth and two on the 12th.
