Sentence In Theft Case Is Pondered

The case of Phyllis (Mrs. Leah) Dickson charged with the theft of some \$14,000 from the New Glasgow, N.S., was adjourned to May 23 by Judge C. St. Clair, Trialor in Queens County Court yesterday for further consideration as to the sentence which is to be handed down to the accused.

Judge Trainor stated, in reviewing the case, that he thought that the offence committed by Mrs. Dickson was a serious breach of trust between an employer and her employer and could not be dealt with lightly.

The case was adjourned to May 23 because of the absence of K. R. MacDonald, who will present evidence to show that the accused is still benefiting from the money which was stolen.

A child welfare commission will also look into the matter. Its evidence will be presented on May 31.

The accused pleaded guilty to the charge on May 13.

Islanders Ready For Victoria Day

Prince Edward Island will join Canada's other nine provinces in observing Victoria Day Monday.

While no official observances are scheduled to mark Queen Victoria's traditional birthday, Islanders are expected to take advantage of the good weather in prospect to catch up on fishing and prepare summer cottages for the summer.

The Canadian National Railways is prepared to meet an expected upsurge in traffic on this first spring-like weekend holiday of the season.

The big carryer, MV Abequell, is now in drydock in Halifax, but CN officials are confident the M.V. Confederation and SS Prince Edward Island will be able to handle the traffic flow smoothly. If not, the Islander is prepared to make extra trips to prevent tie-ups.

The CNR is now operating on its spring schedule which calls for 10 round trips daily. The first ferry leaves both Terminous and Borden at 7 a.m. and the final trip is made at 10 p.m.

The service goes on its summer schedule June 30.

Above normal traffic is also expected by Northumberland and Ferries on the Wood Islands to Caribou, N.S., run. Bus lines and Maritime Central Airways are also expecting heavier traffic as the closing of universities and colleges in many Maritime centres will see many Island students travelling home on the weekend.

Stores, banks, government offices, both provincial and federal, will be closed on Monday.

The increase was not followed immediately by Atlantic Sugar Refineries Ltd. and St. Lawrence Sugar Refineries Ltd. but it was the fifth increase this week for Canada and Dominion
